

# Nichols Takes Carling Open

BIRMINGHAM, Mich. (UPI)—Lessons from a pro, confidence and educated golf won pro golfer's biggest paycheck in seven years for Bobby Nichols. and he planned today to use the \$35,000 to educate his children.

Nichols stood off a shaky challenge Sunday by golf's most prominent charger, Arnold Palmer, and while he couldn't beat par, he beat Palmer and the rest of the field for the top prize in golf's richest tournament, the \$200,000 Carling Open.

Nichols surged into contention Saturday with a 66, the second best round of the four-day 72-hole event on the par 70 Oakland hills course. But he could fire no better than 72 in the final round. It gave him a two-under-par total of 278.

Palmer's last round 71 left him a stroke behind at 279.

They were the only two of the 78-player field who could improve on par of 280 for four rounds.

"I played with Ben Hogan in practice," Nichols confessed, "and I tried to watch him. I learned a lot, and it helped me in the tournament."

"Then when I won the PGA, it gave me confidence, and you have to have confidence to win. You get the confidence you're going to play better, and you do."

"I just tried to hit the greens and make pars to hold the lead," he added. "I figured I'd have to win or lose on the last four holes."

"With guys like Palmer and (Gary) Player behind you, you can't let up. I think I made my greatest shot of the tournament with a five iron within 12 feet of the pin on the 15th and got a par."

Palmer also made what he described as his "greatest shot ever in a tournament when it was important," a cut six iron which hit the pin on the 18th green and dropped six feet away. He made the putt for a birdie to put the pressure on Nichols to finish with pars for the top prize. Palmer's second money was \$17,000.

"Out of the last seven tournaments, I think I've finished second five times and third twice," Palmer said, "and I'm getting damn tired of it."

Player finished third with 281 for an \$8,500 paycheck, while Pete Brown and Ben Hogan, who won the National Open on the same course in 1951, tied for fourth and \$6,850 apiece.

# Angels Stop Tigers, 5-4

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Dave Wickersham, Detroit's winningest pitcher this season, fell victim Sunday to the ailment that has plagued many a Tiger pitcher—the home run ball.

Wickersham started the game against the Los Angeles Angels, and faced four batters. He got none of them out, but all of them home.

Albie Pearson opened with a single and Vic Power duplicated. Then Jim Fregosi hit a long drive that tipped off the glove of Gates Brown and fell into left field seats, 350 feet from home plate. On the very next pitch, Willie Smith powered the ball into the Tiger bullpen. Wickersham went to the showers.

The four-run first inning put the Angels on the way to a 5-4 win for their second straight victory over the Tigers. The clinching score came in the fourth when Albie Pearson got a bad bounce triple over Al Kaline's head in right field and came home on reliever Ed Rakow's wild pitch.

The Tigers spent the entire game trying to catch up. They scored a run off Angels starter Ken McBride on a walk and two singles in the fourth and another in the sixth when pinch hitter Bill Bruton singled home Bill Freehan.

McBride, once the ace of the Angel pitching staff who has been plagued by loss of control, was relieved in the sixth by rookie reliever Bob Lee, but was credited with the victory, his third against 12 losses.

The Tigers made it a cliff hanger in the ninth by scoring twice when Don Demeter doubled home Norm Cash and Brown with two out. Then Bill Freehan hit a scorching line drive which Willie Smith caught at his ankles. The Tigers claimed he trapped the ball... but the umpire's decision stuck and the game ended.

Wickersham took his 10th loss against 16 wins. Detroit opens a two game series against Chicago Tuesday night.

# Phils Lose But Remain 5 1/2 in Front

By United Press International — "The week that was" is over for the Philadelphia Phillies — and happy they are that it's history—but the king-sized hangovers are being nursed by the Cincinnati Reds and San Francisco Giants.

In the last seven days, the Phillies won only three of seven games but the Reds did not better than win four of seven and the Giants won only three of their seven games. And so the Phillies' National League lead remains a tidy 5 1/2 games and t-o-m-e, the strongest ally a team can have in a pennant countdown—is more and more on their side.

It was more of the same Sunday when the Pittsburgh Pirates clobbered the Phillies 10-2 but the Reds and Giants could get no better than a split of their doubleheaders. The Reds rallied to shade the Houston Colts 7-6 after an 8-5 loss and the Giants whipped the Milwaukee Braves 13-10 but then suffered a 7-4 setback.

Bob Veale struck out seven batters to raise his season total to a club mark of 188 behind a 10-hit Pirate attack that included three hits each by Bob Bailey, Roberto Clemente and Gene Freese. Chris Short, who started for the Phillies with a league-leading earned run average of 1.65, was routed in 1 1/3 innings and suffered his seventh loss against 14 victories.

The Reds' chance to make hay out of the Phillies' loss disintegrated when Joe Gaines' four runs batted in paced Bob Bruce to his 13th win for Houston in the first game of the doubleheader at Cincinnati. The Reds committed six errors and fell behind 6-0 in the second game but rallied to win it on Frank Robinson's ninth-inning double.

Jim Davenport's two-run single and a run-scoring single by Orlando Cepeda enabled the Giants to rally for four runs in the eighth inning and win their opener in Milwaukee. But the Braves rebounded in the nightcap as Rico Carty banged out five straight hits and Hank Aaron hit a three-run homer to lead Tony Cloninger to his 14th win.

The St. Louis Cardinals drubbed the Los Angeles Dodgers 5-1 and the Chicago Cubs downed the New York Mets 7-3 in other NL action.

Curt Simmons pitched a four-hitter to win his 14th game for the Cardinals, whose eight-hit attack was led by two hits each by Dick Groat and Ken Boyer. Larry Miller was tagged for five hits and two runs in 5 2/3 innings to suffer his sixth loss.

Billy Williams' 28th homer, a two-run shot in the third inning, paced the Cubs to their 11th win in 18 games with the Mets. Larry Jackson yielded nine hits but pitched out of numerous jams to score his 17th win against 10 losses.
