## Romney Has Big Margin Over Higgins

DETROIT (UPI) — The only northern Democratic congressman to vote against the civil rights bill lost his job in Michigan's primary election Tuesday but in three other cases in Detroit anti-discrimination forces suffered setbacks.

Rep. John Lesinski of Dearborn, who had been officially condemned by the Democratic State Central Committee for his "no" vote, lost to another incumbent, Rep. John Dingell in the newly reapportioned 16th District.

But for civil rights leaders a bitter defeat was inflicted when Detroiters voted 136,671-114,743 to enact an ordinance opponents said would permit housing discrimination.

In addition the author of the "Homeowners Rights" ordinance, Thomas Poidexter, was nominated for the Detroit Common Council by a 2-1 plurality and Samuel Olsen, despite all-out opposition from the NAACP, was renominated for Wayne County prosecutor.

At the statewide level, Republican Gov. George Romney, who has refused to endorse GOP presidential nominee Barry Goldwater, smashed conservative George Higgins by almost half a million votes.

With 96 per cent of the vote recorded, Romney had a 571,868-80,040 edge over Higgins. The unopposed Democratic gubernatorial candidate, Congressman-at-large Neil Staebler, had 496,071 votes.

Owners Rights' ordinance came The approval of the "Homeowners Rights" ordinance came despite condemnation of the proposal by Romney, Staebler, Mayor Jerome Cavanagh, the State Civil Rights Commission and many church and civic groups.

## All Ottawa Incumbents Nominated

GRAND HAVEN — All Ottawa county Republican incumbents were renominated in Tuesday's primary which attracted well over 20,000 voters, compared with about 13,000 two years ago.

The only county race was for sheriff, and incumbent Bernard Gysen took a better than 2 to 1 majority over his opponent, Laverne M. Boeve. Gysen received 12,990 and Boeve, 5,647 on the basis of unofficial returns.

Other Republican incumbents nominated were Prosecuting Attorney James W. Bussard, 12,653; County Clerk Harris Niensma, 14,575; County Treasurer Fred Den Herder, 15,008; Register of Deeds Robert J. Kammeraad, 14,918, and County Surveyor Charles De Witt, 14,374.

Democratic nominees, none of whom were opposed, are Albert J. Russell, prosecuting attorney, 2,273; Burlie N. Dodge, sheriff, 2,264; county clerk, Dolores M. Hall, 2,265; register of deeds, Jay A. Wabeke, 2,274; Peter Van Eyck, 2,269; county surveyor, William J. Duga, 2,282.

Gov. George Romney led the county ticket, totaling 15,907 to 2,201 for his opponent, George Higgins. The unopposed Democratic nominee, Neil Staebler, received 2,488.

Ottawa voters were faithful to a native son, Edward A. Meany Jr. of Grand Haven, candidate for the Republican nomination for U. S. Senator. Meany polled 8,897 votes, to 3,567 for James F. O'Neil and 3,744 for Ely M. Peterson.

Ottawa voters also were loyal to Harold Volkema of Holland, candidate for the Republican nomination for state senator, who polled 10,395 to 5,543 for his opponent, incumbent Frederic Hilbert of Wayland.

The nonpartisan ballot for justices of the court of appeals was more evenly distributed. The unofficial Ottawa vote listed: Maurice Black, 4,058; Robert B. Burns, 4,195; Austin J. Doyle, 3,132; Fred W. Fitzgerald, 6,219; Donald E. Hoolbrook, 5,675; Robert G. Howlett, 4,512; Allan C. Miller, 4,592; Philip H. Mitchell, 4,369; Carlton H. Morris, 3,860; Andrew H. Wisti, 1,859.

## Park Township Elects Officers

Gordon Van Putten was elected justice of the peace and four constables were elected in Park Township in the primary election Monday while all of the other incumbents were returned to office.

Van Putten polled 367 votes for the four-year term while Marjorie De Feyter had 293 votes. Elected constables were incumbents Arnold De Feyter, 546 and Stanley Windemuller, 527. Also named constables were Carl Nies, 461 and John Mulder, 11. Also polling votes for constables were Gary Windemuller, 3 and Edwin Lake, 2.

Supervisor Herman Windemuller was re-elected as he polled 639 votes in the three precincts. Others re-elected were clerk, A. Drew Miles, 632, treasurer, Harvey Tinholt, 649 and trustee, Warner De Leeuw, 610. All were elected to two-year terms.

A total of 436 votes were cast in the first precinct while 280 votes were cast in the second precinct and 264 in the third precinct.

### U.S. Pilot Flees From Reds in Laos

Was Shot Down June 6, Held by Communists; Believed Now in U.S.

BANGKOK, Thailand (UPI) — U.S. Navy Lt. Charles F. Klusmann's "extended tour of duty" as a prisoner of the Communists in Laos was over today. Klusmann was on his way home.

A spokesman for the U.S. Military Assistance Group in Bangkok announced Tuesday that Klusmann, shot down over Laos and captured June 6, had escaped and was safe and sound in Thailand.

Today, the U.S. Embassy said that Klusmann "is no longer in Thailand." Secretary shrouded his departure, but he was believed en route back to the United States.

Although the spokesman refused to discuss Klusmann's flight, it was learned later that he left Laos Tuesday night and was flown directly to Udon Air Base in northeastern Thailand. From there it was believed he was whisked away to the United States.

It was first believed Klusmann stopped over in Vientiane, Laos, but a spokesman said later he was taken directly to Thailand.

During his imprisonment, Klusmann, 30, had written his wife, Sara, in San Diego, Calif., to think of his absence as an extended duty tour.

It turned out to be not all that extended. The military spokesman said Tuesday that Klusmann, "apparently in good physical condition," was at the U.S.-manned air base at Udon, Thailand, 350 miles north of Bangkok, and would be evacuated to American facilities outside of Thailand "as soon as possible."

The spokesman gave no details of Klusmann's escape. Neither did the White House, which made the first announcement in Washington.

The mere fact of the escape appeared to be one of the epiphanies of the cold war.

Observers here speculated that one possibility was that U.S. military or carrier helicopters had rescued Klusmann.

### Storm Dora Is Now Hurricane

SAN JUAN, P.R. (UPI) — Growing tropical storm Dora became a hurricane today and thrashed westward in the Atlantic with 75 mph an hour winds.

Hurricane hunter planes fixed its position this morning considerably north of an estimate during the night. The San Juan weather bureau said the center at 11 a.m. EST was about 200 miles east of San Juan, near latitude 17.0 north and longitude 54.0 west. It was moving toward the west-northwest at about 20 m.p.h.

The position was about 1,820 miles east-southeast of Miami.

### Mrs. Peterson Defeats Rivals

DETROIT (UPI) — Mrs. Ely to be the underdog again in the Peterson campaign. Not a general election when she party worker who never before has run for public office, made her first bid for U.S. Senate Tuesday by outdistancing two rivals to win the Republican nomination for U.S. senator.

Mrs. Peterson, 50, Charlotte, became the first woman candidate of a major party to win the nomination for U.S. senator in Michigan.

The former Republican state vice chairman and former assistant chairman of the Republican National Committee, shrugged off the underdog role to best auto executive James F. O'Neil and Grand Haven sales promotion manager Edward A. Meany for the nomination.

With 5,013 of 5,204 precincts reporting, Mrs. Peterson had 210,048 votes. Meany, father of nine daughters, had 143,643 and O'Neil, a member of the State Board of Education and the favorite in the race, had 112,927.

Mrs. Peterson was expected the nomination for a U.S. Senate seat in Michigan.

She moved to Michigan in 1949 and immediately became involved in Republican politics. But it was not until she threw her name in the senatorial race that she ran for any elective office.

She is married to Col. W. Merritt Peterson, an officer in the Michigan military establishment. The couple has no children.

Mrs. Peterson was born in New Berlin, Ill. She attended William Woods College in Fulton, Mo., and Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill., and is a graduate of Suburban Business College, Oak Park, Ill.

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### Incumbent Van Til Defeated

De Stigter Takes Win In Ottawa's 95th; Democrats Unopposed

One incumbent was renominated and two incumbents were defeated in state house and senate races affecting the local area in Tuesday's election.

State Rep. James S. Farnsworth of Plainwell won over State Rep. Riemer Van Til of

the 95th state district in Ottawa county. Melvin De Stigter of Hudsonville emerged as leader in a field of five seeking the Republican nomination. The 95th district takes in all of Ottawa county except Holland city and the townships of Jamestown and Zeeheld.

In the 95th district, Farnsworth polled 5,501 votes, listing 1,665 in Ottawa, 3,170 in Allegan and 666 in Barry.

Van Til received a total of 4,700 votes, listing 2,926 in Ottawa, 1,437 in Allegan and 337 in Barry county.

There were two other Republican candidates, Peter De Kaker receiving 917 votes, listing 521 in Ottawa, 296 in Allegan and 29 in Barry, and Raymond Wisniewski receiving 725, listing 101 in Ottawa, 280 in Allegan and 314 in Barry. The unopposed Democratic candi-

date, Ralph E. Richms of Holland, received 1,685 votes listing 606 in Ottawa, 788 in Allegan and 292 in Barry.

Volkema polled 11,033 votes, listing 10,395 in Ottawa, 1,600 in Allegan, 1,000 in Van Buren and 239 in Barry. Van Buren received 1,000 votes, listing 434 in Ottawa, 414 in Allegan, 234 in Van Buren and 66 in Barry. The Democratic candidate, Charles C. Wickert who was unopposed received 4,638 votes, listing 2,148 in Ottawa, 1,461 in Allegan, 1,074 in Van Buren and 3 in Barry.

In the 96th district, the only incumbent, De Stigter, received 2,960 votes to a 2-1 Republican nomination. One of the race were Albin M. Grandjean, 2,570; William L. Kennedy, 2,520; David R. Pusnaw, 2,629; and Claude Ver Duzen, 2,299. The Democratic candidate, Malcolm L. Ferguson who was unopposed, received 1,742 votes.

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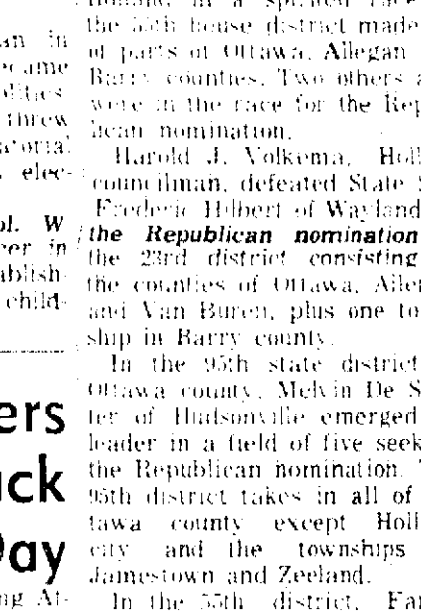
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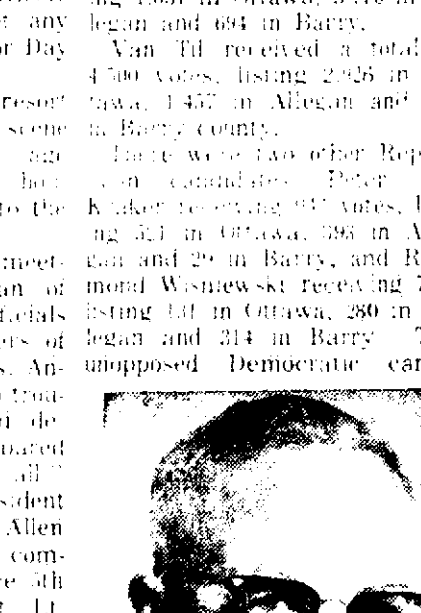

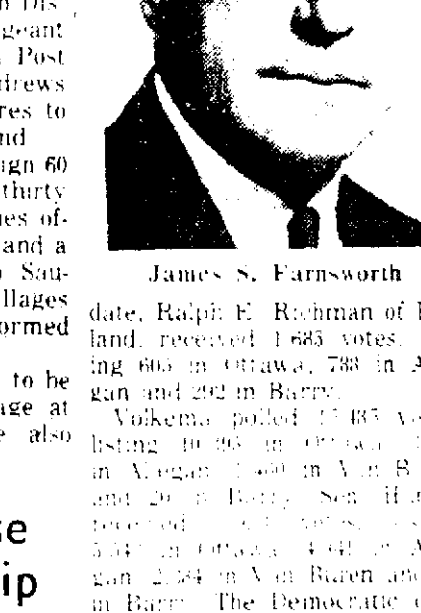
