MAHANNAH WILL FILED.

Capitalist Leaves Home and Kelsey Wheel Stock to Widow.

The last will and testament of A. E. Mahannah, who died last fall, was admitted to probate by Judge Frank M. Guthrie yesterday, and his son, Floyd R. Mahannah, was duly qualified as executor of the estate without bond.

The bulk of the estate, apparently goes to the widow, Mrs. Lizzie Mahannah, the second wife of the deceased. She gets the handsome home at 1577 Carr Avenue, together with the household furnishings, and 100 shares of Kelsey Wheel Company stock. The remainder of the estate, aside from half a dozen personal bequests, is devised to the four sons, Floyd R., J. C., A. A., and M. E. Mahannah. Its value is not indicated in the will.

Mrs. Lottie Edwards and Mrs. Ella Post, sisters of the deceased, are to receive \$2,000 each, while a third sister, Mrs. L. J. Davis, gets \$1,000. Inez P. Davis and Sadie Mahannah were awarded \$500 each.

The family piano was bequeathed to Flora Mai, daughter of Floyd R. Mahannah.

A picture of the first Mrs. Mahannah, who died some years ago, was willed by the father to his four sons. The second wife of Mr. Mahannah and his widow was formerly Lizzie Breen. She has no children.

The will names Mrs. Mahannah and Floyd R. Mahannah as joint executors of the estate, but the widow declined to serve and the court appointed the son to carry out the will of the father.

HELD FOR ROBBERY.

Youth Identified as Highwayman, Declares Sheriff.

Willard Thompson, white youth, was held in the county jail yesterday on a charge of highway robbery, following his identification by J. H. Jenkins, 60, who claimed Thompson was one of two men who robbed him on Mallory Avenue Saturday night at pistol point.

Jenkins, who lives at 56 West Davant Street, was robbed of \$12 to \$13. When he reported the robbery Sunday to C. B. Garibaldi, chief deputy sheriff, he stated he recognized the Thompson youth as one of the robbers. Garibaldi assigned Deputy A. O. Clark to the case and Clark arrested Thompson Sunday afternoon at Mallory Avenue and Florida Street, on a warrant sworn before Squire Ed H. Bradley.
