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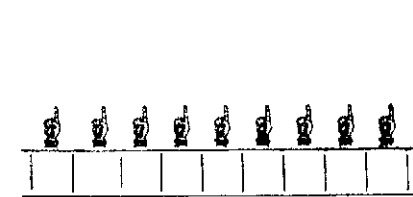

Death of a Lady Well Known Here.
Mrs. Nelson, a highly respected lady of Coshocton, died at her home in that city yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock, aged 64 years. Mrs. Nelson was the mother-in-law of Councilman C. W. Miller, of this city, and has many friends here who will be deeply pained by her death. Mr. and Mrs. Miller will go over to Coshocton on the evening train to attend the funeral which takes place there to-morrow morning, at 9 o'clock. A Rare and Valuable Old Relic.
Dr. Spidell has in his possession an old mill burr or stone that was used by the first settlers, hundreds of years ago, to grind their wheat and corn. It is a flint stone and weighs about four pounds. The stone is cone-shaped, about five inches in diameter and three inches high with about thirty ridges in it. The three-cornered hole through the center of the stone is worn quite smooth and the gauge marks on the bottom of the stone are clearly indented. The Doctor has placed the stone in Black & Rock's grocery, where it can be seen. The stone was used in a mill which was formerly near Putnam, on the Muskingum river.
