THE FATAL R. R. CROSSING.

Mrs. Catharine Stewart and Grandson Struck by a Fast Express.

Slight Prospect of Their Recovery

A very serious accident happened yesterday afternoon at the crossing of the Lima and Delphos road with the P. F. railroad. The limited express train that left here at 3:31 stand time, was in charge of Conductor Craig and Engineer Adams. Approaching the crossing, which is about 350 feet from the Anglaise river bridge close to which is a water tank, on the north side of the railroad, Adams saw a buggy ahead with an unmanageable horse and two persons in the vehicle. He whistled the alarm but the horse was so frightened, or balky that he refused to get off the track. Adams reversed the engine, but it was too late to stop the train in time to prevent the crash. The horse and buggy were both tossed aside as the engine passed over the crossing. The engine was brought to a standstill near the bridge over the Anglaise river, and the crew ran back to the scene of the accident. The horse was dead, and the buggy a complete wreck. It had been raised by the pilot and its occupants thrown with it against the fence, fully twenty feet. One was an old woman. Her scalp was cut clear across the top of the head, falling over like a flip, and the blood from the lacerated arteries was pouring down her face and all over her in a crimson stream. She was also badly bruised about the body but was able to sit up on the ground and say her name was Stewart, though she soon after became unconscious. Her companion was a boy of about 14. His left arm was broken in two places and he was badly cut about the face, and bruised about the body. His moaned with pain when moved. Both the injured ones were quickly placed upon the train, and taken to Delphos for medical aid. The wonder was that they were not both killed outright and the trainmen were fearful that the old lady, at least, might die before medical assistance could be rendered.

The woman proved to be the widow of Nicholas Stewart who died about 4 years ago. He was a well to do farmer of Marion township and left surviving him the widow and a number of grown up children. Married yesterday Mrs. Stewart left her home about a mile and a half northwest of Lima with a load of horses and chickens to sell at Delphos, taking along with her grand son. She drove on the road leading westward from their home crossed the railroad early at Elías Just and turned at a hotel house No. 7 to go northward on the Lima and Delphos road, leading along the east bank of the river. This road crosses the school road about a furlong from the school house. The country thereabouts is level and open so that trains can be seen approaching from a considerable distance either way by persons driving north or south on the pike. Had it not been that the horse became stubborn just at the wrong time Mrs. Stewart and her grandson could easily have avoided the train. As it was they were caught in a death trap midway between their home and their destinies.

The grandson had named Miller who lives about six miles northwest from where the accident occurred was visiting with his grandmother. The injured people were taken the St. Charles Hotel, near the depot where they were attended by Dr. R. L. and Williamson, the railroad company's physicians and Dr. Davis the family physician. By their very little help is expressed of saving the lives of the grand mother Mrs. Catharine Stewart and the boy, whose skull was found fractured, upon a close examination.

THE SCHOOL BOARD

Progress of the South Side School.—A Letter to the Public

The School Board met last night in the Mayor's office, Dr. Hall in the chair, President Probert being absent.

An application from Cynthia Shoemaker for a position as teacher was received and filed.

The bill of R. H. Staples, \$70, on constructing the foundation of the new South Side school house, was ordered paid.

Instructions were given for the purchase of desks for the new school building.

Superintendent Greenleaf was instructed to prepare and publish an explanation of why the Board decided to make a change of readers in the schools and why the Board considers the same chosen preferable to those now in use.

THE REASONS

Ten years ago the Appleton Readers were adopted by the Board of Education of this city and have been used in our schools to the present time. At the time of their adoption these readers were undoubtedly the best in print and they have done good service in the cause of education. Few people will dispute this statement. Yet to say they are the best readers now in use or that they have done good service in the present and also for the next ten or more years is to ignore reality and willfully disregard the improvements in text books during the last decade. The progress in the science of teaching and the increasing needs and demands of the times.

A change of readers affecting 900 pupils is an important measure. It should not be rashly undertaken and should not be made until the best interests of the schools demanded it. Then when a change is considered desirable and is determined upon great care and good judgment should be exercised to secure if possible the best readers that can be obtained.

Without going into unnecessary and tiresome details we wish to state briefly the advantages of the new books over the old terms and method of making the exchange. The Appleton readers are not systematically and carefully graded. The Harpers are far as can be judged without actual class work, are carefully and thoroughly graded. This is a very important feature. The publishers of the Appleton readers have recognized and have tried to remedy this defect in their books by publishing three additional books to be used in connection with the first four readers of their series. One to be used with the first reader one to be used between the first and second readers and one to be used between the second and third readers. These books must be bought to use for the first four readers. In our schools we have not gone to the extent of buying these three extra books and therefore have been working at a disadvantage. The Harpers readers do away with this trouble by supplying what is necessary in the regular series at the same or less cost than the four Appleton readers and thus saving to pupils the cost of three extra books. A second important advantage of the Harpers is in the amount of reading matter. The Appletons as well as most of the readers, do not furnish enough reading matter. Many schools to meet the deficiency have introduced supplementary readers. This requires an extra cost. We have for some time been thinking it would be necessary to provide supplementary reading for the schools. The new readers remove the difficulty by furnishing an extra amount of reading matter with no additional expense.

They contain 50 per cent more reading matter than the Appletons and cost a little less.

The following is a statement of the number of pages of reading lessons in each book of the two series of readers.

Appleton's Readers

First Reader 85 137

Second Reader 135 181

Third Reader 200 278

Fourth Reader 230 363

Total 651 759

There are many minor improvements in the Harpers readers not found in the Appletons. In Harpers following each lesson is a list of all new words in the lesson.

The second reader has an alphabetic list of new words in the book.

The third and fourth have a complete dictionary of all new words used in the books.

In the illustrations quality of paper and printing the Harpers are most excellent.

If pupils readers are bound in linen adding greatly to their durability. The few books will be introduced gradually as classes are changed from one reader to the next higher as from 3d to 4th. In this way the pupils will be supplied with the new readers at less expense than if they buy the Appleton readers. In making the exchange the pupils will pay what is called the *substitution price* if they have no old book to offer in exchange with an old book of same grade or *make-up grade* they will pay the *exchange price* as follows:

1st Reader 45 30

2d Reader 35 20

3d Reader 40 20

4th Reader 40 20

The exchange will be made through the book stores. All pupils are advised to make no exchange or purchase of readers until told to do so by their teachers.

At Dayton, Ohio on Tuesday, Wednesday, August 27, and 28, A. D. 1889

HEADQUARTERS DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

The Democrats of Ohio to be held at Dayton Ohio on Tuesday and Wednesday August 27th and 28th 1889 to nominate candidates for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Judge of the Supreme Court, Treasurer, Attorney General, Auditor of Public Works, Clerk of the Supreme Court, and State Commissioner of Common Schools.

On Tuesday evening August 27th at 8 o'clock the delegates from each Congressional District will meet and select a Vice President, and a Secretary, and an executive committee of each of the several counties.
