The complainant is Cornelius Sullivan, who claims that Humpty stole two coats from his house on Wayne street to which he gained entrance by crawling through an open window. The hearing was continued till next Monday morning, and Humpty was required to give bond in \$200 for his appearance at that time. He could not give bail, and to insure his attendance he was sent to jail.

FRANK IVES VICTORIOUS.

He Beats the Champion a Game of Billiards.

CHICAGO, July 18.—Last night Frank Ives made a total of 315, while Jack Schaefer scored 235 in a game of billiards in Chicago. Ives' average was 18-7-35 and Schaefer's 13-1-31. This is the first time that a "wired" man has ever beaten in a game as long as 300 points by any man save George Slosson and Maurice Vignaux—that is, in a 11-11 match. Ives made the remarkable performance of 235 in nine innings.

Frank Ives will be remembered as having played with the Lima base ball team last year, his position being catcher. He was considered of a favorite here while he stayed.

A Handsome "Hurry Wagon."

Lima has a patrol wagon. That is to say, there's one in the city; but it is not in use. It belongs to the Courtland Buggy Works, which concern made it for East Saginaw; but for some reason that city did not take it. As there had been some talk of Lima needing such a vehicle, the makers sent it here to Mr. P. H. Pangle, who does considerable business with them, in order that he might show it to the city authorities. Not having any place to put it, Mr. Pangle asked and obtained permission to place it in the carriage shop of Comellman John Cox. There it stands, a substantial example of the results of the production of silly suggestions; as this city is in no position to use such a wagon. Aside from the folly of sending it here where it cannot be used to any advantage, the wagon itself is a good enough article. It has iron axles and wide-tired wheels, strong and not too heavy, good springs, Philadelphia gear, high seat in front, with a lamp on each side, and a good brake. Steps at the back lead to the body of the box, around which are leather cushioned seats, with an iron rail at the back, giving ample room for a dozen prisoners and arresting officers. With the wagon is a stratcher, on which to place injured persons, so as to prevent torture by jolting even of this well-equipped vehicle. It is a complete article, and is handsomely painted; the words "Police Patrol," appearing on the sides. The sum for which it was to be sold to East Saginaw was \$450. It can be got for considerably less; and this description of it is printed for the benefit of any city that is in position to buy it. Lima isn't. The Courtland Buggy Works doesn't pay anything for this "ad." It is free.

WAR CORRESPONDENTS.

The Two Charleys and the Western Union Engaged in a Triangular Fight.

Lima has several newspaper correspondents. These are the fellows who send dispatches to outside papers, and draw liberally upon their lively and well trained imaginations for their facts. Far distant readers don't know the difference; and the correspondents get paid by space, or according to the sensationalism of their matter. It's a great trade, and a smart man or woman can make money at it. These correspondents do some good to the town, in keeping it constantly advertised, although they do, once in a while make it ridiculous by wiring some more than usually imaginative story.

There is always more or less rivalry between newspaper correspondents; and just now there is a speck of war among those of Lima.

Last evening Charley Sontag filed a dispatch to the Detroit Free Press. He revealed its contents to Ill. Moore, another correspondent; but asked him not to use it, and Ill didn't, till later. Sontag was sure he had an exclusive, for had he not made it himself? He felt so good on the strength of it that he told Charley Price, another correspondent, that he had sent something good. Price wanted it of course; but Sontag remarked that he wanted something else in a while, to his lovely self. This was all, at that time. It afterwards struck Sontag that he had been foolish in saying anything, as, possibly, Price might catch his dispatch at the telegraph office. So informed and found that Price had gone into the office, read his dispatch and sent the same matter to his papers. Sontag was hot, and went and told Ill. Moore that as Sontag had it he (Moore) might as well use it too, and Moore sent it to Cincinnati and Pittsburgh.

Sontag was so hot that he wired the Detroit Free Press to lay complaint with the Western Union Telegraph company against the Lima office for allowing specials to be revealed, stating that the same thing had been done repeatedly. He followed up his message with a letter this morning giving particulars. He also pitched into Price, who claims that he knew all about it, and offered certain other facts to Sontag which he did not have, as that time. Sontag declares that his matter had no connection with that referred to by Price; and that he's going to break up this inside work, as he is tired of it.

The serious part of the whole affair is the effect of the charge against the Lima office upon Harry Davis, the agent here. It has been the common practice here for the newspaper correspondents to pull together, each tending the others what he had, so that none would get left. They frequently compared notes in the telegraph office, and one would send the other to read his copy. They acted together so completely that nothing was thought of one seeing the special of the other. However such a practice was beyond the rules of the telegraph company, and was only allowed as a convenience to the gang of correspondents. It is safe to say that they'll never again use the Western Union office here as a convenience in this way, as the agent declares if they want to compare notes, they'll have to do it outside, and that no man shall see another's dispatch without the personal order of the writer of it.

A MEAN TRICK.

Fifty Dollars Reward for the Perpetrator.

A very mean outrage was perpetrated between 11 o'clock last night and 6 o'clock this morning at the West Market-street barn of the Street Railway Company. Some person or persons effected an entrance and took from the car, and the wires, the apparatus which runs along on the wire and furnishes the current of electricity to the motor in the car. The wires of this "traveler," as it is called, are insulated, by being coated with India rubber. The outrage consisted of the cutting away of some of the rubber from the wires, and twisting the bare wires together, so that a circuit was made without reaching the motor. When the men went to run out the car this morning they could do nothing with it. It was utterly ruined, and another had to be got before the car could be run.

There is a strong suspicion as to who the perpetrators of this contemptible trick are. It was evidently done for petty revenge, there being no other motive possible. Mr. B. C. Faurot was informed of the occurrence, and offers \$50 reward to any one who will bring him positive proof as to who did the deed.

DECIDEDLY DULL.

Status of the Speculative Oil Business in Pittsburgh.

Following is the report of Saturday's oil market in Pittsburgh, taken from the Cronicle-Telegraph:

The Oil Exchange is no more a business place.

True, there are a number of brokers, who meet there daily, tell choice stories, smoke good cigars and play a fair game of checkers.

Worse than that not a few of the brokers slept during the time they should have been rallying round the bull ring, according to the rules of well conducted exchanges. There was an air of calm over the entire place. The attaches of the place were as sleepily putting in the time as were the brokers who once did the Exchange assume a lively aspect.

The cause of all this was that the sale of 1000 barrels was all the business transacted in the city today. Heretofore 25,000 barrels was considered an unusually small day's business, and one of the brokers remarked this morning: "Things are beginning to look serious and unless oil takes a sudden jump next week, why, don't be surprised if the Sheriff comes around and kindly assists us out of business." This state of affairs is getting monotonous others were heard to say, and unless trade commences to pick up we will all be out at some other business next week. The opening showed 91 1/2, the highest and lowest, and the noon closing showed the same figure.

The funny part of this morning's transaction was the deal of 1000 barrels when the way in which it was made. When oil opened at 91 1/2 one broker jumped to ring and said: "Give me 2,000 at that price." The deal being consummated, the broker from whom the oil was bought in the first place turned around and purchased the 2,000 barrels he had just sold at the same figure.

To say that the transactions created much excitement is drawing it mild and not too much meretricious, for that would imply exertion, and there was nothing which would induce exertion to-day. In fact there was a dearth of movement all around, and the business done excited no comment and created no excitement.

A WONDERFUL INVENTION.

A Process to Revolutionize Lighting. Sold for a Song.

W. F. Morrison, a Canadian from Toronto, Ont., came here about a week ago to sell a process he has invented for producing an "electric" light by chemical action, without the use of a dynamo or motor. He was summoned from Detroit by W. H. Silvey, who is looking for something cheap to perfect his locomotive head light. Silvey put his man Graf on the Canadian, but the Graf could do nothing with him. Silvey then went to Morrison himself, and succeeded in buying the right to use the process for \$2,000—dirt cheap, if it is worth anything at all. It is understood that this process has been tested and will produce a satisfactory light at a cost of only four cents per volt for 24 hours. The electric current is obtained by the action of very strong chemicals in composition cells; and the question to be solved is whether these cells can be used again or whether the cost of their renewal must be encountered repeatedly.

One drop of the compound put in a glass of water will blow up the whole glass. The advantage claimed is that the process will allow batteries of little bulk, without expensive electrical machinery, in any car or residence, and do away with long wire circuits.

Gunning for a Dog.

Morris Berlinger, the tea man was bitten on Wednesday by a dog belonging to Martin Rahilly, who lives an alley east of Union street and adjoining the D. & M. railroad. The animal sank its teeth into the calf of his left leg. Teat once had the wound cauterized by Dr. Stenber, then commended to the Mayor, to have the dog shot. As nothing was done, Berlinger took his little gun this morning and went forth to slay the offending animal, which had defiled him. He fired at the animal twice, and declares he hit it the second shot. Rahilly and his whole family ran out, and got in direct range of the pistol and Berlinger ceased firing and retreated. The dog is said to have formerly bitten four persons: Ed. Kahle, Pat Finn, a man named Dalton and a girl named Sullivan.
