### CITY COUNCIL DOINGS.

Report of the Citizens' Commit-  
tee on Paving.

A Big Batch of Resolutions and Ord-  
inances Passed—Paving to be  
Laid and Sewers to be  
Built, Etc., Etc.

President pro tem Buehler called the  
council to order at 8:30 o'clock.

Clerk Miller called the roll and the fol-  
lowing councilmen answered to their  
names: Buehler, Bourner, Gainer, Helm,  
Lund, Murrath, Miller, Tyrer, Weisberger  
and Wheeler. Messrs. Baird, Grasser and  
Sikes came in later.

The minutes of the previous meeting  
were read by the Clerk and approved.

By permission, Mr. J. F. Lingafelter ad-  
dressed council. Mr. Lingafelter stated,  
substantially, that on the 5th day of July,  
1889, the Newark Machine Company's  
works, in the West End, burned down. The  
company asked for a rebate of taxes in  
consequence of the fire, which Mr. Lingaf-  
elter, who was then county Auditor, re-  
fused. The company then applied to the  
Auditor of State and got an order of re-  
funder. Before recognizing the order, Mr.  
Lingafelter went over to Columbus and  
saw the Auditor of State himself, and from  
him obtained the authority to retain the  
amount of the rebate, as trustee for the city,  
pending the final action of the Machine  
Company. If the Company rebuilt its  
works in Newark, then Mr. Lingafelter was  
to refund the rebate to them. If they left  
Newark, then he was to pay it over to the  
city. The Company having located in Col-  
umbus, the money was now to be handed  
over to the city. Mr. Lingafelter then  
handed Clerk Miller a certificate of deposit  
for the full amount of the rebate of taxes  
allowed, \$352.30, which amount was order-  
ed to be placed to the credit of the sinking  
fund.

Mayor Nichols reported that he had ap-  
pointed William Stivers as a regular patrol-  
man. On motion, the appointment was  
confirmed by the following vote, 9 ayes, 2  
noes and 1 not voting. Bourner and Helm  
voted no and Murrath did not vote.

Councilman Murrath made some remarks  
to the effect that he thought the Mayor  
should follow the regular order and ap-  
point the fire department, pound master  
and bridge tender first.

Mr. Nichols appointed Frank  
Weaver as a regular member of the police  
force. The appointment was rejected, the  
vote standing 6 ayes, 3 noes and 3 not  
voting. Baird, Bourner and Wheeler  
voted no. Murrath, Miller and Tyrer did  
not vote.

Councilman Miller, in behalf of the  
street committee, reported that Eddy  
street ought to be graded as far as prac-  
ticable, that Eddy's third addition to the  
city of Newark be accepted, that South  
Sixth street be widened to the uniform  
width of 45 feet, south of Popular avenue,  
by taking six feet off of each side of the  
street. Also, that the street commissioner  
be authorized to have a sewer connection  
on Baker and Second streets.

The report was referred to the city Civil  
Engineer, with instructions to make the re-  
quired plat.

Councilman Miller, in behalf of the  
street committee, made the following re-  
port, signed by all the committee, which  
was received and filed:

We, your committee to whom was re-  
ferred the bids for street paving, would  
report that after a thorough investigation  
we found that the P. M. Kirk proposed to  
be used by C. H. Connell, do not comply  
with the specifications and are not fit for  
street paving and as he proposes to use  
these bricks, we would recommend that his  
bid be rejected.

The report of the special citizen's com-  
mittee on street paving was then made and  
was placed on file. Following is the re-  
port of the citizens' committee on  
STREET PAVING.

To the Honorable City Council of Newark,  
Ohio:

The committee appointed by your hon-  
orable body on behalf of the citizens, on the  
subject of street paving, to inspect and in-  
vestigate different kinds of pavements laid in  
different cities, have the honor to submit the fol-  
lowing report:

Your committee first visited Columbus  
and there found Asphalt, Granite, Medina  
stone, Hayden block, Porter fire brick and  
the common red brick used in paving the  
streets. On most of the streets in Colum-  
bus we found the Porter fire clay brick,  
which in appearance did not meet our ex-  
pectations, for the reason that when it had  
been laid for two or more years many de-  
fects were visible and no satisfactory ex-  
planation of the cause thereof could be given  
by parties whom we thought should know.

Dents or unevenness of surface in brick or  
stone pavements are very objectionable, and  
should, if possible, be prevented. The  
Granite, Medina stone and the Hayden  
block make better appearance as to wear  
and evenness of surface than the brick, but  
the expense of the brick is much  
greater; however, their durability may in  
the end compensate for the difference in  
cost. The number of miles paved in Colum-  
bus of various kinds of material is  
about twenty and may reach fifteen by the  
end of the season.

The next place we visited was Wheeling  
W. Va. There we found nothing but the  
fire brick pavement of the Porter brand, and  
from information obtained from different  
parties, it gave good satisfaction. There-  
fore, as in Columbus, the same unevenness  
of surface was found, which in a measure  
was explained as follows: That the street  
on which the brick had been laid the long-  
est time, years, had been torn up to lay  
natural gas pipes, and the ground had not  
been properly packed before replacing the  
brick, which in all probability, was the  
true cause. The surface of other streets  
which was uneven and accounted for in  
that the surface of the brick was not  
then inferior when laid, or not sufficient  
care exercised in selecting the best ma-  
terial. Your committee saw one piece of  
pavement at W. Wheeling of about 300 feet in  
length and 20 feet in width, leading from  
the Baltimore and Ohio freight depot to

nearly the edge of the water in the Ohio  
river, where it is said the heaviest haul-  
ing in the city is done, that showed fewer  
dents and less wear than any  
we saw on our trip. Although  
it had been down between four and five  
years one might think it would wear  
fast or twenty more without showing  
much sign of wear. In that pavement  
hardly a dent is visible, and this, in our  
opinion, is due wholly to the solid and firm  
foundation on which the brick are laid.  
Often loads weighing from five to seven  
tons are hauled over said pavement. In  
Wheeling there are, as nearly as we could  
ascertain, about ten miles of pavement  
laid, and the people are highly pleased  
with it.

The next place we visited was Steubenville,  
where the streets are extensively  
paved with the Porter brick. One of the  
streets in said city where the pavement  
has been down about five years, shows few  
dents and less than a quarter of an inch  
wear by actual measurement. We found  
there, as in Wheeling, but one kind of  
pavement, viz: the Porter fire brick, which  
so far as we could learn, gives universal  
satisfaction. In Steubenville, West Vir-  
ginia, fourteen miles above Steubenville,  
where the Porter brick are made and were  
there shown the material, as well as  
how the bricks are made, burned and  
the kind shipped to places  
where they are desired for paving.

If any street paving is to be done in New-  
ark in the near future, it is our opinion  
the use of the Porter fire brick, laid on a  
well prepared bed of good gravel and sand  
and the interstices filled with No. 6 coal  
slag, is the best. This we think will give us  
good satisfaction as any street pavement at  
present attainable at any thing like the  
same cost.

In conclusion we beg leave to suggest  
that in preparing the location of a street  
to be paved, that the contractor be re-  
quired that there is in the neighborhood of  
eight miles of the brick pavement laid,  
and there, as in Wheeling, the people seem to  
be well satisfied with it. Your committee  
also visited New Cumberland, West Vir-

grade and gravel Washington street, was  
carried.

A resolution by Councilman Tyrer, to  
grade South Park avenue, south from  
North street to Shields street, was carried.

A resolution by Councilman Grasser, to  
repair the alley between the American hotel  
and the Fleet and Wilson streets, was  
carried.

A resolution by Councilman Miller to  
gravel Franklin avenue, was carried.

A resolution by Councilman Baird to  
lay an 18 inch tile sewer from the Racoon  
bridge to Sixth, on both sides of Wilson  
street, was carried.

Councilman Heim strongly urged the  
necessity of constructing a sewer on Indi-  
ana street.

By resolution, Mr. J. A. Flory ad-  
dressed the council, in behalf of Mrs. Gil-  
son Althorn; in regard to the same sewer.

A resolution by Councilman Buehler to  
grade and gravel Ferry street, was carried.

A resolution by Councilman Sikes to  
grade and gravel North Fourth street, from  
the Welsh Congregational church to North  
street, was carried.

A resolution by Councilman Murrath to  
put railings to the approaches to the sever-  
al canal bridges of the city, so as to pre-  
vent people from walking into the canal  
after night was carried.

A resolution by Councilman Miller to  
authorize the city civil engineer to prepare  
a profile and grade for Eddy street from  
Granville street to Mott street, and report  
at the next meeting was carried.

A resolution, by councilman Heim, to  
grade the gutter on the north side of  
Indiana street, was carried.

A resolution by councilman Miller, to  
place six inches drop around the public  
square, was declared out of order for want  
of money in the fund.

Councilman Bourner said something  
should be done for Church street, between  
Sixth and Eighth streets, as it was in a  
dangerous condition. He said that a re-  
solution to that effect, which the Presi-  
dent declared out of order, for want of  
money in the fund. Mr. Bourner took an  
appeal from the decision of the chair and  
the matter was sustained by a vote of 10  
ayes to 2 noes.

A resolution, by councilman Baird, to  
authorize the street commissioner to lay  
the sewer pipe at once on Wilson street,  
was carried.

Councilman Buehler said that the gut-  
ters in the Seventh Ward had not been  
cleaned this summer and that they needed  
cleaning badly.

By resolution, Mr. Wolverson addressed  
the council in regard to the addition of  
Spring street, which he said had been badly  
washed by the recent rains and needed im-  
mediate attention. There being no money  
in the fund, nothing could be done with  
the street at present.

A resolution by councilman Sikes, to  
place a gas post in front of Dr. Spencer's  
residence on North Fourth street, was car-  
ried.

A resolution by councilman Buehler, to  
clean the gutters in the Seventh ward, was  
lost by a vote of 11 ayes to 2 noes.

An ordinance, offered by councilman  
Miller, to accept A. Flory's third addition  
to the city of Newark, was passed under a  
suspension of the rules.

An ordinance, offered by councilman  
Weisberger, was also passed under a  
suspension of the rules. This ordinance  
regulates the making of excavations  
or trenches on the public streets,  
especially those streets where the bid being  
laid, and provides that all parties  
making such excavations in the  
future must first get a proper permit  
from the city clerk, and also make a de-  
posit of a sum of money sufficient to prop-  
erly replace the portion of the street re-  
moved; said excavation to be properly filled  
and rammed and made perfectly solid.

An ordinance, by councilman Miller, to  
regulate auction sales, was put on the first  
reading.

An ordinance, by councilman Tyrer, to  
pave both sides of Holiday street, was  
passed under a suspension of the rules.

An ordinance, by councilman Sikes, to  
build a sewer from Union street west on  
West Main street to the lands of Joseph  
Swartz, was passed under a suspension of  
the rules.

A revised ordinance, regulating the fines  
for misdemeanors and fixing the penalty at  
from \$1 to \$50, was passed under a suspen-  
sion of the rules.

An ordinance, by councilman Bourner,  
to oblige the city to issue \$600 in bonds  
to extend Western Avenue, was put upon  
its first reading.

An ordinance, by councilman Wheeler,  
to cobble the gutter on both sides of Mill  
street, between Main and Baltimore streets,  
was passed under a suspension of the rules.

An ordinance, by councilman Wheeler,  
to cobble the gutter on both sides of Mill  
street, from Eastern Avenue to Baltimore  
street, was passed under a suspension of  
the rules.

An ordinance, by councilman Baird, to  
pave the south side of Granville street,  
from Hull to Broad street, was lost, by  
vote of 10 ayes to 2 noes.

The finance ordinance was passed under  
suspension of the rules.

On motion, council then adjourned to  
meet next Monday evening, July 29.
