A "FRAUD MOST FOUL,"

Was That Editorial in the

American Last Night,

Equal to Its Celebrated Romance,

Entitled, "Bill Jones, or the

Vengeance of William

Capitellor."

Last night the American publishes one

of its usual double-headed editorial lies,

with big headlines as follows: "Fraud

Most Foul! Plans Perfection for a Gigan-

tic Steal from the Taxpayers of Newark"

etc., etc. Any one reading these headlines

would think that a gigantic fraud had

been committed by the city council, but on

reading the article through he finds that no

fraud has been committed but that it is

charged one is to be committed in the fu-

ture! Therefore, the American's editorial

is a deliberate fraud itself and the editors

of that sheet know it. It is a deliberate

lie, made out of whole cloth, from begin-

ning to end. Nothing as startling has

appeared in that sheet since the produc-

tion of their great sensation-

al romance, entitled "Bill Jones, or the

vengeance of William Capitellor."

But, every intelligent citizen knows that

the American's editorial is as easily as it

is false. The Democratic councilmen are in-

teelligent and honest men, and are doing

their whole duty, faithfully. Every step

in the street paving matter has been taken

according to law, openly and right under

the public gaze, and every subsequent step

will be taken in the same manner. The

contract will be let, according to law, to

the lowest bidder furnishing the proper and

approved material, and the American knows

that it lies, when it says anything to the

contrary. The cost of the paving will

probably be \$35,000 and the

abutting property owners will have

pay for it. The American knows that it

tells another gigantic lie when it says that

the paving will cost \$250,000 and that the

taxpayers of the whole city will have to

pay for it. No wonder that the Republi-

cans of this city and county are thorow-

ly sick of such an irresponsible and utterly

unreliable sheet as the American, with its

fraud editorials, conducted by two petred

and disappointed office seekers, who

have tried to grab everything that was

loose and are now desperate.

Suppressed It.

The American, in its garbled report of

the proceedings of the city council last

Monday night, refused to print the report

of the special citizen's committee on street

paving. The Advocate published it in

full. The report was not only a matter of

general news, but it is one in which the

Newark public are just now most deeply

interested. The American suppressed this

important item of news. The committee,

who have carefully inspected the various

street pavements that have been put down

and are in use and who make their report,

is composed of two Republicans and one

Democrat—all good business men and
