

GLORIFY IN CANOVAS' DEATH

Anarchists at New York Hold a Meeting to Celebrate.

EMMA GOLDMAN TALKS WILDLY

Denounces the Dead Premier as a Despot, Whom the World is Better Without—Police Come In for a Scolding.

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—A group of anarchists who make their headquarters in this city held a meeting today to "celebrate" the death of the leading despot of Spain, Canovas del Castillo, executed by the anarchists. Emma Goldman, S. J. P. Spencer, P. Kater, Charles W. Mowbray, Alberto A. Monro, H. M. Kelly, Arrango Guinlan and a few others were present. The meeting was held in a hall in the city.

H. M. Kelly presided. "We are here tonight," said Kelly, "to celebrate the removal from this world of the life of a despot whom we should not have in the world. We are pleased that the leading despot of Spain is dead. It will no longer torture human beings. It will no longer be a crime that I must be placed in the category of criminals."

Emma Goldman next made her appearance, carrying with her pictures of the anarchists, Cesarro and Pallas. Among other things she said:

"We can't be sorry for the death of a man who was not a human being, but a beast. He invented most horrible tortures for the poor people. I glorify his end. Another tyrant will take his place and another Goll will rise up. Tortures and prisons will not prevent it. I see all the police and detectives here. They are too lazy to go to work in factories. I see them here to stand on street corners and let their clubs fall on someone's head. The death of Canovas I consider the most important act of the last twenty years. I am sure that Goll will not be the last man to show the world that we are tired of despotism."

Frequently while Miss Goldman was speaking there was loud cheering, followed by cries of "bravo."

There was a large force of uniformed policemen and detectives at the meeting, which was a crowded one.

VERY SURE ON SHERMAN.

Spanish Officials Think President McKinley Should Curb Him.

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—The World points the following dispatch from San Sebastian, prefacing it with a statement that it has passed through the hands of the Spanish censor:

"The censor and several other leading statesmen, both liberal and conservative, have been questioned concerning the opinions of the Spanish government on the Spanish revolution."

They are firmly convinced that the Spanish government and justice would soon overrule the people's secretary of state, even if the traditions of that office did not oblige Mr. Sherman to understand the expediency of abstaining from compromising expressions of opinion formerly compatible with the independent position of a member of the senate, but not with that of a minister of the great republic."

It seems the lines of division are already visible in the ranks of the conservatives.
