TRAMP BOOTBLACK.

George Sullivan Traveled Across the Continent.

Was Here a Few Hours Wednesday Evening on His Way Home to Brooklyn, N. Y.

Red-headed, freckled, pug-nosed, fairly well dressed and carrying over his shoulder a large bootblack's kit, on which was painted in large letters, "Geo. Sullivan, Brooklyn, N. Y.," answers well the description of a small boy who called at the HERALD office Wednesday evening and bade farewell to those who were in the office at the time. As none of the persons in the office had ever seen the boy before they were naturally somewhat surprised when the stranger announced that he was "George Sullivan," but as the caller was not backward about talking to the reporter in the office at the time found it an easy matter to get the story of his youthful life.

George is a newsboy and bootblack of Brooklyn, where he has lived all of his life supporting his mother by selling papers and doing odd jobs. Last summer he was taken with a mania to see the world and accordingly started without a cent in his pockets and without anything save the clothes on his back and his trusty kit over his shoulder. When he left home he decided that he would go to San Francisco seeing what he could of this country enroute. The one thing that George brags of more than anything else is that he has traveled all the way from New York to San Francisco and this far on his return trip without spending a cent for railroad fare. He loves to relate the secret how he has accomplished this feat. He says that so far on his journey his principal mode of travel has been on the steps of baggage cars, and from this point of view he has already seen nearly the whole breadth of the state of Columbia.

An aristocratic "hobo" of the first water, is George, he not being at all satisfied like most of the "professors" to travel on "white line sleepers" or "any old thing" but he always chooses only through fast passenger trains. George said that many times while he was traveling through the West he would hide under the seats in passenger coaches and be "trowed off" by the brakeman, but says he, "nevertheless I would never walk as I would always 'hop' the last coach as the train again started up and in this manner I traveled through nearly the entire western part of the country." This boy with the sunset hair has in his possession a book which already is a relic of no little value, and which in years to come will be worth its weight in gold. The book contains the postmark of all cities of any importance in the way across the country. The book also contains several letters of recommendation and introduction which speak in the highest terms of the bootblack.

The book also contains newspaper clippings without end giving accounts of George's experience over the country. George prides himself on the fact that he has not yet begged for a cent but has made his way solely by "snooping" and what little donations anyone might wish to make. He says that he has spent very little money; having already sent over \$100 to his mother, he having a plan by which as fast as he accumulates a dollar he purchases an express money order and sends it home to mother. George claims that he can give the finest shine and in the quickest time of any bootblack in the country. When the subject of this sketch arrives back in Greater New York, the *News* will publish a full account of his travels and experiences together with a cut of the boy. George is only a little over 16 years of age, yet he is as sharp as a tack, and will always make his way here below all right. Sullivan drifted into this city last evening from Chicago. It is probable that he left last night on the P. F. limited, as he said when he left the HERALD office that he was going to stay here for Cleveland, and from there he was going direct to Pittsburgh and then home.

Pen. Counterfeiters.

Counterfeiters on the wholesale scale have been discovered in the penitentiary. The only sufferer is the "O. P. restaurant," the meal coupons of which have been counterfeited by the hundred. The coupons are sold to convicts who have money to their credit or who are able to earn overtime money. Saturday thirty-seven prisoners were arraigned in the prison court, and all pleaded guilty to having used the counterfeiters for pie, cakes and other eatables not to be had in the dining room. The counterfeiters have not yet been caught.

DON'T LIE TO REPORTERS.

Cardinal Gibbons Has a Word To Say On The Matter.

Cardinal Gibbons in his address before the New Orleans press club, uttered the following truth:

"If I had one piece of advice to give a public man more than another it is, be frank with the reporter. It has been my privilege and pleasure to come in contact with and to know a great number of reporters. I have steadfastly adopted a policy of absolute frankness with them, and I have yet to have confidence betrayed. They have never proved themselves unworthy of the estimate I placed on them as gentlemen. It is the public man who conceals, which every act of concealment is perceived by the reporters (for in the nature of their business, they must be quick to perceive), it is this very concealment which induces the reporter to further conduct his investigations and often get wrong what, had he been in confidence of the man whose manner had provoked investigation, he would have understood and written intelligently about. And it is this very manner that much of the complaint against the reporters originate. Tell the reporters the absolute truth. Never deceive them."

COUNTY IN DEBT.

Mass meeting of Tax Payers of Van Wert County Called.

The county funds of Van Wert county are in somewhat bad condition. The ditch and county funds have been overdrawn over \$43,000, and the tax levy is now as high as the law allows. A bill is now pending in the legislature, asking permission to issue bonds amounting to \$43,000, and to make a higher tax levy. The examining committee, appointed to look over the annual report of the county commissioner, say in their report that the commissioners have done many things without any warrant of law, and that bills have been paid and contracts entered into illegally; that too much stationery, etc., had been purchased. Orders amounting to about \$8,000 have been issued and presented for payment to the county treasurer, who has endorsed on the back of the same, "Not paid for lack of funds." The other day the county auditor was refused credit in the purchase of stamps for the county, unless he became personally responsible. The taxpayers have issued a call for a mass meeting next Saturday to discuss the situation.
