Canoy Hanks Now Thought to Have Been a Victim of Robbers.

NEBRASKA CITY, Aug. 6.—The family and friends of Canoy Hanks, the wealthy farmer whose dead body was found on a sandbar in the Missouri river near Peru the other day, after three weeks' absence of Hanks, do not take any stock in the theory that he suicided while temporarily insane. They say that there was nothing in his conduct previous to his disappearance to justify such a suspicion.

Hanks was not a very great believer in the efficacy of banks as a place of deposit and was in the habit of carrying large sums of money on his person. On the day he dropped out of sight he had a sum estimated at the way from \$60 to \$100 on his person and carried it in a small leather wallet. This was not found on him when his body was discovered and gives color to the belief that he may have been robbed and murdered. The family has offered a reward for any information that will establish that theory and the police are looking up the matter.

On Lodge Pole creek there is a small fall, where power could be secured, and Heckman had rigged up an apparatus to convert this to the work of turning a grindstone. Yesterday morning he went out to sharpen a sickle on the moving machine. While he was engaged in the work the wind agitated one of his coat tails and it caught in the driving shaft, winding it round and round. He was missed an hour afterwards and was found dead. His body was in a stooping posture, his chest drawn across the shaft so tightly that life was extinct.
