

# MILLIONS MORE.

ANDREW CARNEGIE PLANS EXTENSIVE BENEFACTIONS.

The Great Manufacturer Determined to Dispose of His Wealth for the Public Good.

New York, July 10.—The Herald says: Andrew Carnegie still has \$5,000,000 to give away in public benefactions. Mr. Carnegie himself is authority for this statement which he made recently at Skibo castle, to a member of the New York chamber of commerce committee who is now in the city but wishes his name kept secret. According to Mr. Carnegie, he is still undecided in what manner to dispose of his wealth for the public good. He wishes the public to obtain the best results from his future benefactions, and for that reason has not yet formulated any philanthropic statements. Mr. Carnegie admitted that free libraries and other educational institutions would undoubtedly obtain a portion of the millions in question in order that the plans he had previously adopted should be fully developed. His hearers judged from what he said he was considering the advisability of directing his wealth toward endowing and supporting art galleries, scientific museums and similar institutions.

## SIXTEEN YEARS AGO.

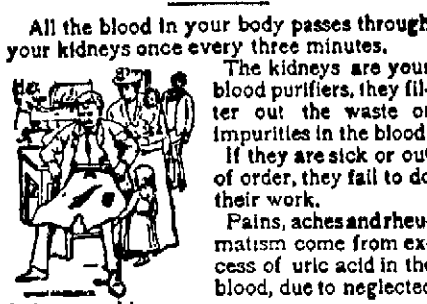
Storm Period of Present Time Causes Residents to Recall Tornado That Visited Oshkosh July 8, 1885.

The storm period of the past three or four weeks has caused the memories of many of the old settlers to go back to the days of the earlier times when Oshkosh was visited by some calamities which were frightful in results. It was just sixteen years ago Monday, July 8, that this city was visited by the worst tornado ever experienced in its history. The storm struck the city in three distinct parts, one part sweeping down sixteenth street, one part traveling the course of the river and the third sweeping all before it along the length of New York avenue and spending the remainder of its force in the country adjacent to Oshkosh. The monetary damage done was estimated at \$200,000 and some eighteen or twenty people were more or less injured, although none was fatally hurt. The storm struck the city about twenty minutes to eight o'clock in the evening and although it was of short duration after it was over the amount of wreckage and damage found to have been sustained was as great as that of several hours of fire. The most serious damage occurred at the corner of Sixteenth and Oregon streets. At that point a store belonging to Henry Hoffman was turned literally inside out. The building was totally destroyed and the goods scattered about the street. A barn was also razed and some of the stock which was stored in the building destroyed. The fair ground buildings were blown down and the damage at that place was estimated at \$15,000. Other buildings in various parts of the city were damaged to a greater or less extent and the number of roofs which were lifted off buildings was large. Relief for the sufferers of a substantial nature was given immediately by the more fortunate residents and a concert was given for their benefit by Mrs. Abbie Carrington. The storm was of more than a local character and other cities in this part of the state were visited also.

## ALL BUT THREE SIGN.

Bowen Street Residents Strongly in Favor of Electric Line.

All but three of the residents of Bowen street are eager to have the electric railway extension on that thoroughfare. Forty-four residents on the street in the blocks where the proposed tracks are to be laid wish to have the service past their doorways. They have so expressed themselves by placing their signatures in a long line attached to the following petition: "To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Oshkosh. The undersigned residents of the city of Oshkosh respectfully petition your honorable body to pass an ordinance granting to the Winnebago Traction company the right to lay its tracks on Bowen, Washington and State streets in accordance with the terms of an amendment to its franchise hereto attached."

Appendix to the petition is the franchise of the Winnebago Traction company, containing the following amendments providing for the proposed extension: "Commencing at the intersection of Main and Waukego streets, thence east on Waukego to State street, thence south on State to Otter street, thence east on Otter street to Bay street, thence south on Bay street to Cease street, thence east on Cease to Rosalia street, thence north on Rosalia to Washington, thence east on Washington to Linde avenue, thence north on Linde avenue to Merritt street, thence west on Merritt to Bowen, thence north on Bowen to Irving street, thence west on Irving to Main street."

"Commencing on Bowen street at the intersection of Merritt, thence south on Bowen to Washington, thence west on Washington to State street, thence on State to Waukego."

## Should Primary Tuition End Earlier?

A valuable addition to the current discussion on the length of school life has been made by Prof. H. H. Harwood, in an address at Tabor academy. His thought on the subject leads him to the conclusion that the primary education of children should cease at the age of twelve or thirteen and that the succeeding years in school should be devoted to training along vocational lines. He insists upon a radical reduction of the time now devoted to the classics, arguing that a better knowledge of Greek and Roman civilization can be acquired through a reading in English of the history and institutions of those nations and times than by the study of the classics. Those suggested changes, the professor believes, would result in that union of general culture and practical knowledge which he thinks should be the aim of the education of the day.—New York Post.
