THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE WILL VISIT THE BIG SHOW ON
THURSDAY, SEPT. 5—CABINET OFFICIALS AND SU-
PREME COURT JUDGES TO BE PRESENT.

PRESIDENT WILLIAM
MCKINLEY will be the guest
of the Pan-American Ex-
position on Thursday, Sept. 5.
The day will be known as
President's day. The presidential
party, including Mrs. McKinley, Mrs. Bar-
bour, Dr. and Mrs. Rixey and Mr. Cor-
telyou, will go from the President's
home at Canton by way of Cleveland,
arriving in Buffalo in time to devote
the day to the Exposition. The Presi-
dent and his party will be the guests
of the Hon. John G. Milburn, president
of the Pan-American Exposition Com-
pany. The President's Cabinet and the
Supreme Court will also attend him
while in Buffalo.

At 11 o'clock on the morning of the
5th an escort of United States troops
will meet the President's party, the
Cabinet and the Supreme Court at
President Milburn's house and accom-
pany them to the Exposition, entering
at the Lincoln parkway gate, at the
southern end of the grounds. Here
they will be received by the director
general of the Exposition, the Hon.
William I. Buchanan, the board of di-
rectors and other officers of the Ex-
position and conducted to a reviewing
stand in the Esplanade. All the cere-
monies of the day will be within the
Exposition grounds. A magnificent
pageant will pass in review. From
the reviewing stand the President and

Rochester Day, Sept. 7.
Rochester is to have a special day at
the Exposition, and Saturday, Sept. 7,
has been selected as that day. A train
service will be arranged for that date
that will comfortably accommodate
25,000 people, and special will be run
over the Central, Erie, Lehigh Valley
and West Shore direct to the terminal
station at the grounds.

The fare has been cut for that day
to \$1.15 for the round trip. An elabo-
rate programme will be arranged by
the Exposition officials in honor of the
Flower City people.

Spanish-American War Veterans,
Sept. 9.

The members of the Spanish-Ameri-
can War Veterans' Association are to
hold a reunion at the Pan-American
Exposition on Monday, Sept. 9, and the
day will be known as Spanish-Ameri-

can War Veterans' day. Exercises of a
patriotic character will be held in the
Temple of Music. Many distinguished
officers of the Army and Navy will be
present. The music at the Exposition
on Spanish War Veterans' day will all
be of the patriotic order, and there will
be dress parades and drills by Uncle
Sam's fighting men who are at the

show. The association has a large
membership, and the majority will at-
tend the reunion.

Rhode Island Day, Sept. 10.

Rhode Island's special day at the
Pan-American Exposition occurs on
Sept. 10, the anniversary of Commo-
dore Perry's great naval victory on
Lake Erie. Oliver Hazard Perry was a
Rhode Islander, and the memory of
his triumph is still green in the patri-
otic, enterprising and productive little
state. There will be a reception in the
Rhode Island parlors at the New Eng-
land building and suitable exercises in
the Temple of Music. The orator of
the day will be Hon. Henry J. Spooner
of Providence, a former member of
Congress, a man of national reputation
and one of Rhode Island's most elo-
quent public speakers. Governor Greg-
ory and his staff will be present with
an escort, which will include a crack
cavalry command from the brigade of
Rhode Island militia. State officials
and distinguished citizens will accom-
pany the official party. The programme
in its details is now being arranged by
the Hon. John S. Kenyon, president of
the Rhode Island commission, who is
heartily seconded by the directorate of
the Exposition. A company of Rhode
Island infantry will be visitors at the

display in connection with the march

Florida Day, Sept. 11.

Saturday, Sept. 11, has been set aside
as Florida day at the Pan-American
Exposition. A large number of Florida
people will be present. Governor W.
S. Jennings and his staff, escorted by
three military companies and two
bands from Florida, will enter the
grounds at 11 o'clock and proceed to
the Temple of Music, where the direc-
tor general, Hon. William I. Buchanan,
will deliver an address of welcome. The
Governor—by the way, a first
cousin of the Hon. W. Jennings Bryan,

whom he is said to resemble—will
speak on the resources of Florida. The
orator of the day will be Charles
Parkhill, Esq., of Pensacola, Fla., one
of the finest speakers in the South.
The presiding officer will be Colonel
Thomas M. Weir of Tampa, special
commissioner to the Pan-American Ex-
position for Florida. Appropriate
music will be interspersed.

This programme may be elaborated
if the Press Association of Florida, 500
in number, can attend on the date
designated, Sept. 11.

Builders' Day, Sept. 11.

The National Association of Build-
ers has arranged with the Pan-Ameri-
can Exposition to have Sept. 11 set
apart as Builders' day. The idea in
mind is that such a day will be the
means of bringing together at the Bu-
falo Exposition builders from all parts
of the country, who would naturally
have a special interest in the build-
ings, as well as the Exposition itself,
and who would also find much pleasure
through assembling in fraternal fash-
ion.

The National Association does not
propose to hold any convention meet-
ings, but advantage will be taken of
this gathering to have one social af-
fair, possibly a banquet, to which all
builders present on the day indicated
will be welcomed.

No attempt will be made to secure
reduced rates of transportation espe-
cially for this occasion, as reduced
rates may be negotiated for from al-
most every section of the country up-
on fully as favorable terms as could
be arranged under any special plan.

Indiana Day, Sept. 14.

Vassar College Day, Sept. 14.

One of the appointed special days at

looked forward to with bright antici-
pations is Vassar College day, Sept. 14,
when the students and alumni of that
famous and popular educational insti-
tution will meet for a season of sight-
seeing. There will be special cere-
monies at the Exposition.

Honduras Day, Sept. 15.

Honduras has a handsome building,
filled with its products, at the Pan-
American Exposition. It is pleasantly
situated in the Court of State and For-
eign Buildings and is one of the most
popular resorts for Exposition visitors.
A view of the exhibits is a revelation
to those who have not hitherto investi-
gated the resources of the country.
Honduras will have a special day at
the Exposition, Sunday, Sept. 15, which
is the anniversary of Liberty in that
country. A programme appropriate to
the occasion is being prepared. Many
of the chief officials of Honduras will
be present.

SPECIAL DAYS AT THE PAN-AMERICAN

THE week beginning Sept. 15
will be Lumbermen's week
at the Pan-American Ex-
position. Thousands of whole-
sale and retail dealers in
lumber from all parts of the United
States and Canada will be at the great
New World's Fair, and they promise
to make the week a memorable one.
One of the organizations which will
be well represented is the Concatenated
Order of Hoo-Hoo, which has a
membership of upward of 8,000.
The annual meeting of the Hoo-Hoo
will be held at Norfolk, Va., from
Sept. 9 to 13, and the delegates will
go direct from the Southern city to the
Exposition.

The Concatenated Order of Hoo-Hoo
is essentially a lumbermen's order, be-
ing composed of lumbermen, timber-
men, saw and planing mill machinery
manufacturers, newspaper men and
railroad men, being those engaged in
the lumber trade and those allied in-
dustries which are so closely interwoven
with the conduct of the lumber
business as to make them practically a
part thereof.

Mexico Day, Sept. 16.

the large hotels in Buffalo being in-
cluded in the plans.

Grand Army Veterans' Day, Sept. 17.

G. A. R. day at the Pan-American
Exposition, Tuesday, Sept. 17, will be
one of the truly great days of the sea-
son. It follows closely the national
encampment, which is to be held at
Cleveland, and many thousands of vet-
erans and their families will embrace
the opportunity of viewing the won-
derful sights at the great New World's
Fair. An elaborate programme ap-
propriate to the occasion will be carried
out. Numerous special features will
be provided in honor of the visit of the
veterans. Among the bands which
will be at the Exposition on G. A. R.
day are Brooks's Marine Band of Chi-
cago, Nineteenth Regiment Band of
St. Catharines, Ladies' Military Band
of Boston and the John C. Weber Mil-
itary Band of Cincinnati. Band con-
certs will be given forenoon, afternoon
and evening. There will be a free or-
gan recital by Seth C. Clarke of Buf-
falo in the Temple of Music in the af-
ternoon. In the evening there will be
one of the most magnificent displays
of Pyrotechnics ever seen. The day
will be one long to be remembered.

New York State Day, Sept. 18.

New York State day at the Pan-
American is Sept. 18, and an effort will
be made to eclipse all previous records
for attendance on that day. Low rail-
road rates will be obtained from all
parts of the State, and there will be a
large gathering of public men, poli-
ticians, orators and distinguished citi-
zens, besides members of the National

the day will be Rev. D. Rhoslyn
Davies of Allegheny, Pa.; Hon. Ellis
H. Roberts of Washington, D. C., and
General Thomas L. James of New
York. The leader of each winning
choir will receive a silver loving cup.

St. Catharines Day, Sept. 20.

St. Catharines is an enterprising and
progressive city in the province of On-
tario, Canada, which has a splendid
display of its natural and industrial
resources at the Pan-American Ex-
position. The wide awake citizens have
planned a special day for their city at
the Exposition, and they promise to
make it one of the most entertaining
and liveliest of days. Friday, Sept. 20,
has been designated as St. Catharines
day. An excellent programme is being
prepared.

Pennsylvania Day, Sept. 20.

Pennsylvania is represented with a
State building and a comprehensive
exhibit of the great resources of the
State at the Pan-American Exposition,
and great numbers of her people have
visited the great show. A special day
for Pennsylvania has been set aside,
Friday, Sept. 20. Arrangements are
being made for a grand observance of
the day. There will be special excu-
sions, starting from all important
points in the State, and the indications
are that many thousands will patronize
them. A programme of exercises, in
which the most distinguished state-
men and business men of the common-
wealth will participate, is now being
prepared by the State's commissioners
to the Exposition.

Trained Nurses' Day, Sept. 21.

Trained nurses from all parts of the
United States and Canada will gather
at the Pan-American Exposition on
Saturday, Sept. 21, which has been
designated as Trained Nurses' day.
During the week beginning Sept. 16 the
International Congress of Nurses will
be held in Buffalo.

The American Society of Superin-
tendents of Training Schools for
Nurses will hold its annual meeting
Sept. 16 and 17. This society is com-
posed of the superintendents of all the
large nurse training schools of the
United States and Canada.

The Nurses' Associated Alumnae of
the United States, which has now
about 3,000 members, also holds its
annual meeting the same days.

The International Council of Nurses,
a branch of the International Council
of Women, and composed of the lead-
ing women of the profession through-
out the world, will hold a business ses-
sion on the 16th. This council has
called an International Congress, which
will be in session for three days, Sept.
18, 19 and 20. The Order of Spanish-
American War Nurses will hold its
annual meeting that week, probably on
Tuesday. These meetings will all be
held in the Women's Union.

On Saturday, the 22d, a mass meet-
ing of all these organizations will be held
in the Temple of Music of the Ex-
position. Many of the old army nurses
of the Civil War are expected to be pres-

Nebraska Day, Oct. 2.

Probable Expenses of a Visit to the
Pan-American.

Naturally most people who con-
template visiting the Pan-American
Exposition desire to know what it will cost.
I am going to assume that every one
can learn the cost of a round trip
ticket to Buffalo good for 15 to 30 days.
I would advise every one to prepare
for at least a two weeks' trip. Those
who come on short limit tickets gen-
erally regret that they cannot stay
longer to enjoy more fully this rare
opportunity for pleasure and study, for
I am safe in saying that never before
has there been such an opportunity for
the pleasure seeker or such a magnifi-
cent school of progress for those who
wish to study what the world is doing
in all lines of effort. No one who can
possibly raise the money to visit the
Exposition should for a moment think
of denying himself this signal ad-
vantage.

The people of Buffalo have made
ample preparation for the entertain-
ment of all who come to the Ex-
position. In addition to the large number
of hotels, where the rates are mod-
erate, the private houses have been
very generally thrown open for the
entertainment of guests. Visitors may
find comfortable accommodations as
low as 50 cents a night for lodging,
while better accommodations close to
the Exposition can be secured for 75
cents and \$1 per night. Breakfasts
are served by many of the householders
at 25 cents to 50 cents, and there is an

figures. The cost of living in Buffalo
should not exceed \$2 or \$2.50 per day

parades of live stock and vehicles take
place. The Midway also is free, ex-
cept where one chooses to enter the
concessions. There are some 50 shows,
ranging in price from 10 cents to 50
cents, all of them of unusual merit.
