## SPECIAL DAYS AT THE PAN-AMERICAN

**T**HE week beginning Sept. 15 will be the lumbermen's week at the Pan-American Exposition. Thousands of wholesale and retail dealers in lumber from all parts of the United States and Canada will be at the great New World's Fair, and they promise to make the week a memorable one.

One of the organizations which will be well represented is the Concatenated Order of Hoo-Hoo, which has a membership of upward of 8,000. The annual meeting of the Hoo-Hoo will be held at Norfolk, Va., from Sept. 9 to 13, and the delegates will go direct from the Southern city to the Exposition.

The Concatenated Order of Hoo-Hoo is essentially a lumbermen's order, being composed of lumbermen, timbermen, saw and planing mill machinery manufacturers, newspaper men and railroad men, being those engaged in the lumber trade and those allied industries which are so closely interwoven with the conduct of the lumber business as to make them practically a part thereof.

This council has called an international congress, which will be in session for three days, Sept. 18, 19 and 20. The Order of Spanish-American War Nurses will hold its annual meeting that week, probably on Tuesday. These meetings will all be held in the Women's Union.

On Saturday, the 22d, a mass meeting of all these organizations will be held in the Temple of Music of the Exposition. Many of the old army nurses of the Civil War are expected to be present. The Surgeon General of the United States Army has appointed a delegate to represent the Army Nurse Corps. The Victorian Order of Nurses of Canada will also send representatives and all the nurses' clubs and alumnae societies of this country and Europe.

**Oregon Day, Sept. 25.** In Oregon everything that happens is on a big scale. Evidence of this is seen in the exhibition buildings of the Pan-American Exposition. The State's exhibit is one of the most complete and interesting at the New World's Fair. All who view it pronounce it highly creditable to the productive and progressive State. The plans for Oregon day at the Exposition are on a scale characteristic of the State. The chief officers of the State, representatives in the National Legislature and other prominent organizations will participate in the exercises. Sept. 25 is the day set aside for Oregon day.

**Cleveland Day, Sept. 26.** The enterprising city of Cleveland will have a holiday on Thursday, Sept. 26, which has been designated as Cleveland day, at the Pan-American Exposition. Arrangements will be made for low rate excursions both by rail and water, and many thousands of the Forest City's citizens are expected to make the trip to the Exposition, where a programme of exercises appropriate to the occasion will be carried out. The Mayor and other city officials will deliver addresses. Distinguished Ohio statesmen will be invited to participate in the exercises. The arrangements for the event are in the hands of committees composed of Cleveland's most prominent and influential men, and success is assured.

**Nebraska Day, Oct. 3.** Nebraska has a fine exhibit of its products at the Pan-American Exposition, and the State is to further distinguish itself by the observance of a special day at the Exposition. 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## HINTS FOR FARMERS

**Swamp Muck.** Muck or swamp mud taken out in the fall and left to freeze and thaw during the winter, then to dry in the summer and placed under cover, before fall rains wet it makes one of the best absorbents for the liquid manures in the stables. Being well filled with vegetable matter, it has a value as a fertilizer of itself when used on sandy soil or other places deficient in vegetable matter. When dry, it has but little weight, yet is about as absorbent as porous as a sponge and possesses the power of retaining the moisture it absorbs. So much does it have this power that it is often well to facilitate drying in the summer by working it over and mixing with it leaves or straw manure, both to increase vegetable matter in it and to admit more air into the heap to dry it. As an absorbent of ammonia it is valuable to use for burying dead animals or fish or for mixing night soil and hen manure. When large animals are to be buried in it to be converted into fertilizer, use plenty of unslaked lime around the carcass to hasten decomposition and to prevent the escape of unpleasant odors. There are but few farms which have not somewhere a deposit of such muck, and often two jobs can be combined by taking it from the ditches, which will also serve to drain the swamp or bog. The best time for digging it is when the season is very dry.

**Running Farm Machinery.** No man can be considered an expert in running farm machinery unless he attends to certain points in managing the machines. First, keep every joint and bearing well oiled. Next, see that all parts which are liable to collect dust are brushed clean at least every week the team is unhitched, and see then that every nut and bolt is in place and holding the parts snugly. Not only that, but if a rattle is heard when at work investigate at once and stop it, even if it is necessary to unhitch the team to make it safe to work on it. Keep all cutting parts clean and sharp and see that the draft is just right to be as easy as possible for both team and machine. The man who does all this will accomplish good work and not injure team or machine.

**Dry Weather Grasses.** Experience during recent dry summers strongly emphasizes the chief weakness of blue grass—its almost total failure to grow during dry weather. Orchard grass has been found to be the best of the ordinary grasses in this respect, but the common red clover has shown its superiority to any of the smaller grasses for either hay or grazing in dry years. Highly prized as are the old blue grass pastures, it seems clearly proved that giving quantity of food would be produced by putting them under a rotation, with corn and clover the chief crops. This would involve more labor, but in present conditions would give better prospects of profits, said the late Professor G. E. Morrow.

**Watering Horses.** A small item, yet one that should not be overlooked in the management of the work teams, especially during the summer, is that of giving them water before they are harnessed. If the watering arrangements are convenient, it will take but a few minutes more to water them before breakfast, and they will not only relish their food better, but it will be digested better. At this time of the year horses are always thirsty in the early morning and if not watered before they eat will invariably drink more than is good for their digestion, as more or less of the food will be washed into the stomach before being digested.

**Destroy the Tassel.** When a corn can have only a small patch of sweet corn or an extra early patch, I always pull out all tassels as they appear, except one to the hill, says a Kansas correspondent of Farm and Home. The result is earlier corn and ears well filled, grains plump and a third more corn, as most every stalk matures two ears, sometimes three. Have also tried it with popcorn with the same good results. My theory is that the strength the tassel would have used in maturing was absorbed by the corn, one tassel being sufficient to fertilize the hill.

**Shredded Corn Fodder.** The western farmers who have begun to use shredded corn fodder are now declaring that a ton of it is worth more than a ton of hay for milk cows, says American Agriculturist. We came to the same conclusion years ago in regard to corn fodder well grown, cut when fit and fed dry or moistened with water; it is better than hay for milk and butter products, producing a better article at less cost. We never tried it, shredded fodder, but can imagine there would be less waste to it.

**Home Fertilizers.** The backbone of farming is barnyard manure and green fertilizers. Plow these under every year in sufficient quantities, and the heaviest crops can be raised without injuring the land. Then, when needed, dress the land with artificial fertilizers to add nitrogen, potash or phosphoric acid, as the case may need. Some crops absorb more of one of these elements than others, and it is essential to know which is being used in excess of others.

**Feed the Skim Milk.** Farmers have a splendid market for skim milk returned from the creamery and one they do not always utilize to the very best advantage. ## PEOPLE OF THE DAY

**Views of Consumption Specialist.** Professor Robert Koch, the famous German scientist whose investigations of the dreaded malady of tuberculosis have been watched with deep interest for years, was the most prominent figure at the recent British tuberculosis congress. Professor Koch's address before the congress was one of the notable events of that gathering of especially able men, but he did not find all those present in entire agreement with his views. For instance, the professor's assertion that there is little if any danger to the human race from bovine tuberculosis was combated by Earl Spencer and other famous scientists. But it seems that Professor Koch's declaration that tuberculosis is not hereditary is the final word on this question. For some years the leading physicians of the world have been adopting this opinion. The professor said in his address that the cause of the spread of consumption was the sputum of those suffering from the malady, and he advocated isolation of all patients in free hospitals.

**At Johnson's Successor.** Robert E. Wright, who has been brought into public view as the probable successor of the late Albert L. Johnson, the deceased president of the Lehigh Traction company, is a lawyer, banker and business organizer of Allentown, whose fame extends far beyond the city of his home. Mr. Wright was born in Allentown on Feb. 15, 1818, his father having been a prominent lawyer. Mr. Wright, after his admission to the bar in 1848, joined with his father in the legal business, but soon became conspicuous in the development of industrial and financial enterprises. In 1861 he became president of the Allentown National bank, one of the leading and successful establishments of its kind in the Lehigh valley. He also served as the professional advisor of the Lehigh Valley, the Reading and the New Jersey Central railroad companies. Later he has been associated with the famous Cleveland brothers war leaders, in their development. His election to the head of the Lehigh Valley traction enterprise would be a normal and natural continuation of his recent and past activities.

**America is Europe's foe.** The European sees in America a competitor who, while refusing to buy, throws her wares on every market, and who, while she drives the peasant from his land, addresses the profits of industry which support the wage earners of the town. Most curious of all, he marks a rapidly growing power, which, while it underbids his wares, closes to him every region of the wide earth where he might find niches adapted to its needs. Lying like a colossal across the western continent, with her ports on either ocean, with China opposite and South America at her feet, the United States bars European expansion. South America and China are held to be the only accessible regions which certainly contain the iron, coal and copper which Europe needs, and the United States is determined that she shall prevent it. South America and China shall not be used as bases for hostile competition. Regarding South America her declarations are explicit, and during the last 12 months her actions in Asia have spoken more emphatically than words.—Brooks Adams in Atlantic.
