

MR. MINOR IS DOWNED BY SHIPPING INTERESTS.

GROSVENOR, THE BUCKEYE REPRESENTATIVE, WILL HEAD COMMITTEE ON MERCHANDISE.

CHANGE IN LAST FEW HOURS.

The Speaker inclines against the Subsidy Plan and the Wisconsin Map is Against It—The Friends Thereof, However, Have Brought Pressure to Bear—This Has Been a Negative Day at Washington—The Sessions.

(Special to The Northwestern.) Washington, D. C., Dec. 4.—An important change in committee assignment has been practically determined upon in the past twelve hours, which will mean the retention of Representative Grosvenor of Ohio as chairman of the committee on merchant marine and fisheries, and the disappointment of Representative Minor of Wisconsin, who was an active candidate for the place, and had been regarded as the next chairman.

Grosvenor is an active advocate of the ship subsidy idea and Minor just as active on the other side with Speaker Cannon leaning his way. It is said, however, that his friends were too active and too bitter, which aroused shipping interests that they brought such pressure on Cannon as to cause him to change the assignment and side track Minor.

AS TO PANAMA.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 4.—Representative Livernash of California introduced a joint resolution today, "defining the intention of the United States concerning the isthmus of Panama." It declares on the part of the United States any intention to impair Colombian sovereignty, or to support the republic of Panama against Colombia, or to interfere in the relations between Colombia and Panama.

As a result of the death of ex-Congressman Springer, who was chief counsel for the state of Illinois in the drainage canal litigation brought by the state of Illinois, the hearing of testimony in the canal case before United States Commissioner Bright has been indefinitely postponed.

SENATE SESSION.

It has been considered probable that a resolution for the adjournment of the extra session of congress will be brought in but none was offered and a session was provided for tomorrow with the hope that an adjournment agreement may be reached by that time.

CABINET MEETING.

At the cabinet meeting today it was arranged that the formal presentation to the president of General Rafael Reyes as envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary on a special mission from Colombia to the United States shall occur tomorrow morning. Secretary Hall will introduce General Reyes.

THE HOUSE. The house was in session but five minutes today. Mr. Hunter of New York and Mr. Nevin of Ohio were sworn in as members at 12:05 p. m., the house adjourned until tomorrow.

PLATT AND PRESIDENT.

Senator Platt of New York had a brief conference with the president today, but the details of the interview were not disclosed.

MARTIAL LAW PROCLAIMED.

Governor of the State of Colorado Takes That Action in Regard to Cripple Creek.

(By Associated Press.) Denver, Col., Dec. 4.—Governor Peabody at noon today issued a proclamation declaring Cripple Creek under martial law and suspending the writ of habeas corpus. He declared that the gold camp is in a state of insurrection and rebellion and that the civil authorities are powerless.

ACCEPTED UNSECURED BAIL.

Philadelphia Magistrate Placed on Trial on That Charge.

(By Associated Press.) Philadelphia, Pa., Dec. 4.—Magistrate C. Harry Fletcher today entered bail in the sum of \$1,000 for his appearance at court on the charge of misconduct in office. He was accused by an agent of the law and order committee of accepting unsecured bail. A few days ago Judge Fletcher allowed a bill of information against the magistrate, but the latter's counsel obtained a stay of proceedings from the supreme court. The argument for Fletcher's arrest was sworn out on the suppression of the district attorney. Magistrate Fletcher today entered a hearing. His case will go to the grand jury after the information proceedings are argued before the supreme court.

SUGAR BEET INDUSTRY.

REFUSE SUGAR BOUNTY.

Minnesota Supreme Court Passes on the Law.

(By Associated Press.) St. Paul, Minn., Dec. 4.—The supreme court today decided that the state was under no moral obligation to pay sugar bounties under the law enacted in 1895 and that the law was unconstitutional. The Minnesota Sugar Company sued the state and secured a writ of certiorari to compel the state auditor to pay a bounty of \$20,000 which it claimed it had earned under the sugar bounty act of 1895.

BAD FIRE IS RAGING.

Wholesale Stores at Salina, Kansas, Will Be Destroyed—Bad Blaze at Peoria, Ill.

(By Associated Press.) Topeka, Kan., Dec. 4.—A special to The State Journal from Salina, Kan., says: The H. D. Lee Mercantile company's building is afire from top to bottom with no hope of saving any portion of the building or its contents. This is the largest wholesale grocery and nation store in Kansas and carries a million dollar stock. The H. D. Lee Hardware company's building, a block in length and four stories high and situated across the alley, caught at one o'clock and is now burning fiercely. The hardware stock is valued at over \$500,000.

AT PEORIA.

Peoria, Ill., Dec. 4.—A big fire is raging in the blacksmith shop of the Parlin and Osendorf Flour company at Peoria, Ill. This department will be totally destroyed and efforts are now being made to save the remainder of the immense factory. The loss if confined to the one department will be in excess of \$15,000.

WILLIAM M. SPRINGER DIES OF PNEUMONIA.

THE FORMER REPRESENTATIVE OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS IN CONGRESS EXPIRES AT WASHINGTON.

ILLNESS FOLLOWS A COLD.

Deceased Was One of the Prominent Democrats of Illinois and at One Time Was Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee of House—He Had Been Practicing Law at the National Capital for Several Years—Sketch.

(By Associated Press.) Washington, D. C., Dec. 4.—Former Representative William M. Springer of Illinois, a Democratic leader conspicuous in the house of representatives during the forty-fourth to the fifty-third congresses inclusive, and once chairman of the ways and means committee of the house, died at his residence in this city today aged sixty-four years.



His death was due to pneumonia contracted in Chicago Thanksgiving day. He was attending a dinner there and was suddenly taken with a violent chill. He left Chicago the following day and arrived here last Saturday afternoon. His family physician, J. B. Gregg, said he was not seriously ill, but Mr. Springer grew steadily worse.

THE END.

His condition became critical yesterday and a radical change for the worse occurred last night. He died rapidly and passed away at 3:25 o'clock this morning. His wife and son, Captain R. W. Springer, United States army, who has been stationed at Fort Myer, were at his bedside during the last hours of his life. His funeral arrangements have been placed in the hands of a local undertaker.

SALSBURY WAS GENEROUS.

CONTRIBUTED WITHOUT RESERVE TO CAMPAIGN FUNDS OF GRAND RAPIDS ALDERMEN.

The Trial of the Boudlers Resumed at That City and the Ex-City Attorney Continues His Story of Corruption—Johnson Now Before the Court.

(By Associated Press.) Grand Rapids, Mich., Dec. 4.—The examination of Alderman Charles T. Johnson charged with accepting a bribe from Lant K. Salsbury to support the latter in his bid for the city of Grand Rapids, was resumed today. Salsbury alleges he bribed a score or more of prominent citizens including the managers of three local newspapers, was taken up in police court yesterday and is now in jail. Salsbury recovered again to take the stand as a witness. He was unable to remember any more than the substance of various conversations with Johnson in the summer of 1900, but stated that Johnson asked him to support the water deal for \$1,000 in cash, \$750 of which Salsbury said he paid him.

A GO-BETWEEN.

On cross-examination, Salsbury said he did not meet Johnson until after the trial of the Boudlers. He said that he was a go-between between Johnson and the police on a bribery charge, going to him. The reason for this was that Johnson was a friend of Salsbury and Johnson was friends and that in case of an exposure Salsbury believed Johnson would not be so quick to give Salsbury away as he would himself. Salsbury said that he did not meet Johnson until after the trial of the Boudlers.

Salsbury could not tell the number of times he talked with Johnson about the deal, nor could he tell the date of the payment, saying merely that it was between June and September. Salsbury said he also gave Johnson \$100 or \$200 for his campaign and that he contributed money to the fund of every Democratic candidate for alderman.

THE DEFENSE.

In Johnson's case a suggestion of the character of the defense was given by a question asked by Attorney Carroll: "Did you ever have any talk with Alderman Johnson upon the water deal except when he agreed to support me?" Salsbury said that such an important matter should be submitted to a vote of the people.

WOULD FREE MINERS.

Habeas Corpus Writs Are Sued Out in Colorado—Insurrection.

(By Associated Press.) Telluride, Col., Dec. 4.—Writs of habeas corpus have been issued by Judge Wardlaw from the county court, ordering the sheriff to bring Secretary Carpenter and twelve other miners, who are in the custody of the sheriff, to the county court at Telluride. The writs were issued on the ground that the miners are being held without trial and that they are being held in violation of the law.

ELVEN MINERS KILLED.

The Coal Drains in a Belgium Workings—Badly Mangled.

(By Associated Press.) Liege, Belgium, Dec. 4.—Eleven coal miners were killed today at the Gravelle mine at Liege, through the breaking of the rope by which the cage was lowered. The men were precipitated to the bottom of the pit and their bodies were horribly mangled.

WHEN ATTORNEY APPEARED.

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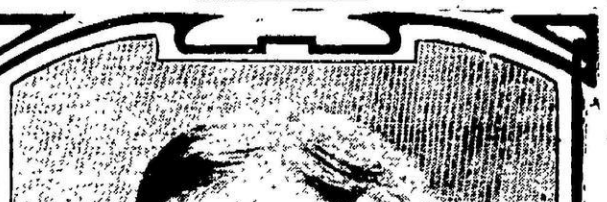
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Ziegler Will Fight.



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The effort to take William Ziegler, the millionaire New Yorker, to Missouri to plead an indictment charging him with supplying \$15,000 for bribing members of the legislature, is expected to develop into one of the hottest battles ever fought in the prolonged conflict between the two great baking powder combinations. After several postponements, the application for extradition papers comes up for a hearing before Governor Odell Monday and it is not unlikely that a further delay will result. All this delay, it is said, has been given to enable Mr. Ziegler's lawyers to prepare for the argument before the governor and to collect such proof as may convince the governor that extradition should not be granted. Unfold and interesting features of the controversy, it is expected, will be brought to light at the hearing.

DYNAMITE IS DISCOVERED.

CHICAGO POLICE FIND QUANTITY OF EXPLOSIVE HIDDEN IN THE NORTHWEST PART OF CITY.

It Is Believed That the Persons Who Secreted It Are Connected With the Car Burn Bandits—Jailor Is Offered a Bribe by One of the Quartette.

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
