NEW SECRETARY OF WAR, GIVEN PRAISE BY PRESIDENT

Laudatory Statement is Issued—Appointee is a Democrat.

Washington, June 20.—Gen. Luke E. Wright, of Tennessee, formerly ambassador to Japan, was appointed secretary of war yesterday to succeed Mr. Taft, whose resignation takes effect June 30. In making this appointment the president was influenced by the desire to recognize in an emphatic way that there is no longer any dividing line between the north and the south, and that all good Americans are in thought and deed one, and still more by the fact that General Wright's personal attributes and experience pre-eminently fit him for this particular position.

Army Men Admire Him.
The statement given out at the white house concerning Mr. Wright's appointment says:
"As Philippine commissioner and later as vice governor and governor he won the affection and regard of the army to a high degree, and many of the most distinguished of the men who served in the army at the time he was in the Philippines have urged his appointment, because they felt in a peculiar way that he was their champion and in a peculiar way understood them and their needs. This is especially true as regards the men who were union veterans of the civil war, for these grew to feel that he was always specially interested in their welfare."

"Moreover, his great administrative and legal ability both peculiarly fit him to deal with the problems in the Philippines, Panama and Cuba; for the work of the war department is now such that only a man with special fitness and unusual training is able to do justice to it. Of all the men in the country the president feels that Luke Wright is the man best equipped to take up the work of the department which for the last seven years has been under the control, first of Root and then of Taft."

Hero of Memphis Epidemic.
"As a young man he was a captain in the confederate army. He is one of the leading lawyers not only of his state, but of the entire south. He has also been foremost in advocating and insisting upon fair treatment for the colored people. He first definitely established his reputation in the terrible days of the yellow fever epidemic at Memphis, when he practically made himself mayor of the town and took charge of all the relief measures, showing what may justly be called heroic devotion to duty and indifference to his own life together with the masterful qualities of a successful administrator in a great crisis. He was himself struck down by the plague he was fighting, but lived to see it stamped out and himself to take part in introducing into Memphis the hygienic measures which have since made it one of the model health cities of the world."

In McKinley's Confidence.
"He was appointed by President McKinley as one of the Philippine commission and enjoyed President McKinley's heartiest confidence, being selected as one of the southerners who were in sympathy with his administration. By President Roosevelt he was promoted first to be vice governor and then governor of the Philippines and was afterward made first ambassador to Japan. In all positions he served with signal fidelity and ability, and has been in hearty and outspoken agreement with the administration in all its main policies."

APPOINTED A DEMOCRAT.

Memphis, Tenn., June 20.—Gen. Luke E. Wright declined on grounds of propriety to discuss the announcement that he would succeed Secretary Taft in the war department until he had received further advice from Washington. General Wright, who was made American ambassador in 1906 to Japan, arrived here early last fall, having resigned his portfolio. It has been generally predicted by many of his friends that he would enter President Roosevelt's cabinet in the event of Secretary Taft's nomination for the presidency.

The new secretary of war is a democrat and for eight years was attorney general of Tennessee. He comes from judicial stock, his father, Archibald W. Wright, having been chief justice of the state.

THE ACADEMIC COURSE IS COMPLETED BY YOUNG LADIES

Commencement Exercises at St. Augustine's Academy Well Attended.

Library hall was well filled Friday evening by people interested in the sixty-second annual commencement exercises of St. Augustine's academy. There were two graduates in the academic course, Miss Marie Anne Nolan and Miss Marie Margaret Kelly. Miss Nolan gave the welcoming address. A musical program preceded the giving of "Ruth," the bible story adapted to a musical setting by the members of the senior class. Those who took part in rendering a Rossini overture for two pianos were Celeste Rieman, Helene Clifford, Elizabeth Moritz and Bertha Byanski. "Grandma at the Masquerade," by the little people, had for an accompanist Miss May Centlivre. In "Ruth" the parts of Naomi, Ruth, Boaz and Orpha were well taken by Mary Remmert, Gertrude Hayes, Ethel Hobrock and Frances Ryder. The students spoke well and the scenes and tableaux were extremely pretty. The other numbers of the musical program were the playing on two pianos of Liszt's rhapsody, No. 2, by Beatrice Kinder and Marie Sommers, a vocal duet by Josephine Burns and Leona Mager and a vocal quartet by Bertha Byanski, Alice Burns, Helen Gerow and Margaret Travis. Frequent applause by the audience expressed the pleasure the entertainment gave.

At the close of the musical part of the entertainment the graduates were presented their diplomas by Rev. P. F. Roche, pastor of the Cathedral, who paid a high compliment to students and teachers. Then came the principal address of the evening by Rt. Rev. H. J. Alerding.

Bishop Alerding's Address.
Bishop Alerding addressed the audience as well as the class. He complimented the class and the work of the sisters, of whom he said, "Money may pay teachers and erect great buildings, but it will never buy the devotion and strict application to duty for conscience's sake that is seen exemplified in the work of the sisters of St. Augustine's."

Bishop Alerding reviewed briefly the progress in educational work, but laid much emphasis on the first need in educational work, that of training the human will. The prime purpose of education, he said, is not the acquiring of knowledge, but learning the proper control and direction of the will. It is that which makes a man or woman of value in the world, and when the will is right it is not so much consequence what a man knows as what he does. Many times men who have had little knowledge in the common acceptance of the term have accomplished much. On the other hand many men who have had much learning have practically done nothing. The love of right should be instilled into the hearts of the young that they may hold to that purpose and have that ideal when manhood and womanhood have been reached. Religious teaching is a need and a necessity and a Christian education is of first importance. The second factor in Christian education is the Christian home, the home where the parents have a religious life and train their children in Christian living and where ideals are formed which are never forgotten.

In addressing the graduates Bishop Alerding bade them Godspeed, but exhorted them to remember the principles and true ideals they have been taught in their school life, that in the future they may become benefactors in their own home and whatever vocation they may choose.

HELD A SOCIAL SESSION

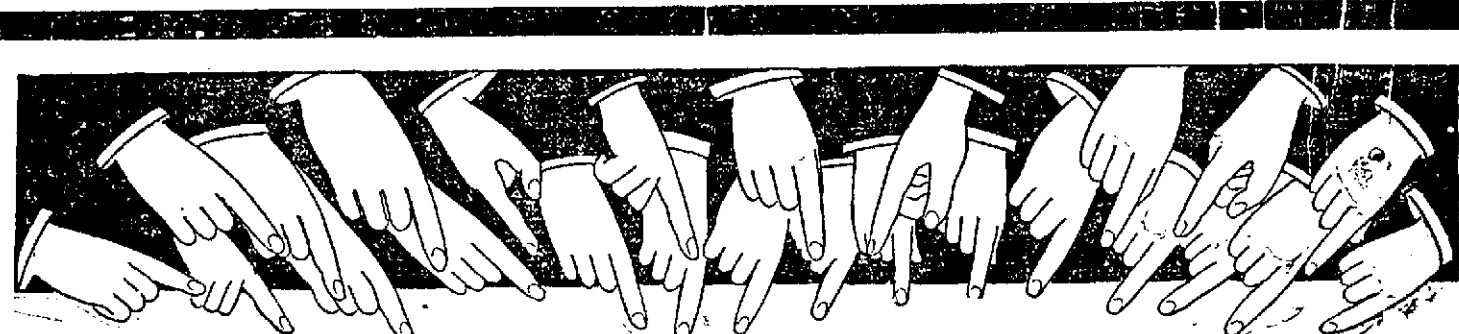

WINONA CHORAL CONTEST.

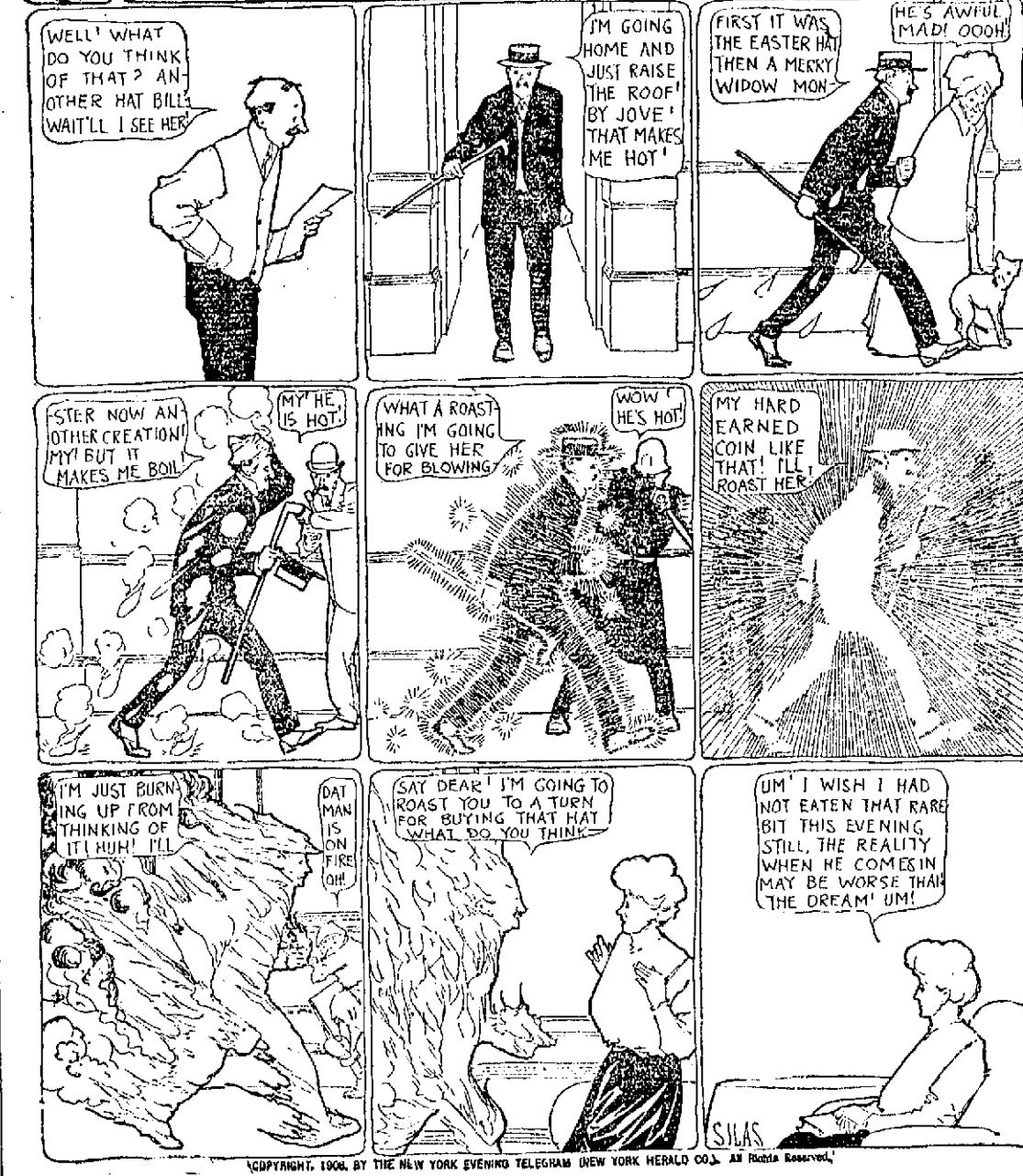
Official Program is Announced—Fort Wayne in the Competition.

Winona Lake, Ind., June 20.—One of the talked of events among the musically inclined people of the territory of the Winona Assembly at this time is the choral contest which takes place next week Thursday, July 26. This annual musical contest at Winona has always been one of great importance among the choral societies of northern Indiana and western Ohio and this year, having been placed outside the assembly dates, seems more popular than ever from the large registration of popular musical organizations that are planning to come over and carry home the prize money and the honors of the occasion. South Bend, Fort Wayne, Plymouth, Goshen, Elkhart, Muncie, Marion, Wabash and other Indiana towns will be represented, while Van Wert, Lima, Vandalia and points in Ohio are announcing strong competitors for the prize money. Chicago and some of the other large cities will also have its musical talent in line for some of the honors.

Thirteen hundred dollars in prizes will be handed out to the winners in this contest. The first session of the contest will begin at 2 o'clock and the great musical festival will continue on through the afternoon and evening. The afternoon program will adjudicate a baritone solo competition, key of F minor, "The Earl King," prize \$10; duet, soprano and alto, competition, "Song and Hope," prize \$12; male quartet, competition, "Sleep, My Lady Love," prize \$20; ladies' chorus, competition, "The Snow," prize \$25; grand ladies' chorus, two hundred voices, "The Snow." The evening will have a bass solo competition, "The Hermit," prize \$10; tenor solo competition, prize \$10; male chorus competition, prize \$30; grand male chorus, two hundred voices; soprano solo competition, prize \$10; mixed chorus competition, prize \$50.
