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LIVING FLAG OF  
SCHOOL CHILDREN  
Pretty Evening Feature of  
Turnfest Beginning  
on June 16.  
PROGRAM A BIG ONE

But two weeks remain before the coming of thousands of visitors for the kites turnfest to be held in Fort Wayne June 16, 17, 18 and 19, and one of the pretty features of the opening night exercises at the court house square will be the formation of a living flag by some 700 to 800 Fort Wayne school children. Massed upon a grandstand to be erected there, one side will represent the American emblem, red, white and blue, and the other the turnfest flag of black, red and gold. Children will sing "The Star-Spangled Banner," "America" and "Die Wacht am Rhein."

There will be a monster torchlight parade on this opening Friday evening preceding the exercises at the court house square. The City Packard band will render a concert program, the united singers of Fort Wayne will have several numbers on the program, and addresses by Mayor Jesse Grice, Chairman Victor Kaiter, of the turnfest committee, and by Hon. Adolph Roggen, president of the Indiana district.

Reception of Turners.  
Fort Wayne turners, with a band, will meet all incoming trains on Friday to welcome the visiting societies from Cleveland in a special train, from Toledo, Dayton, Cincinnati, Newport, Ky., Covington, Ky., Louisville, Ky., Danville, Ill.; Chicago in a special train, Grand Rapids and Detroit.

Friday evening also there will be a meeting of the judges at Turner hall, where the rules will be explained in detail and the judges will be given plans of work and a book giving all possible information in order that no confusion may ensue.

Contests Begin Saturday.  
Saturday morning the contests will begin on the turnfield at the Driving park. Each society will first have to go through an obligatory marching drill and free exercises. The field events, shot put, three consecutive standing broad jumps and far-high jumps in which each man must enter, will be next on the program. Arrangements have been made on the field so that nine societies will work simultaneously.

Saturday afternoon the apparatus exercises will begin. Each man must perform two exercises on the horizontal bar, two on the parallel bars and two on the horse. All the contestants will start at the same time, and about forty judges will watch their work. Exhibition features, especially by the ladies' classes, will be given at the same time.

Parade Saturday Evening.  
Work at the Driving park will stop at 4:30 o'clock on Saturday, and an hour later the men will be conveyed downtown in special cars for the big parade of the meeting. This promises to be an exceptionally fine feature of the turnfest. All the visiting societies will march, and the German societies of Fort Wayne will be represented by floats, each symbolizing the character of the society. The floats will be original in character and of an entirely different type than any previously seen in this city.

Saturday evening will occur the exhibition at the baseball park, which will be brilliantly illuminated for the occasion. The societies entering here will show many special features of their own work, and the ladies' classes and the school children will be largely represented.

Program for Sunday.  
Sunday morning will be given over to rehearsal at the Driving park for the great mass drills, and at 9 o'clock the special field events will begin, three former and two additional events to be shown in the series of five, and in order to be eligible to compete here the man must have scored at least seven points in the first three field events. At the same time there will be men-

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tal exercises at Turner hall—debates, declamation of poems, singing, reading of prize essays, etc.

Sunday afternoon model exercises will be given at the Driving park and later the mass drills, in which all outside teams will be represented. The program will also include a reed drill for ladies and a free exercise for men. The distribution of awards will occur in the evening.

Monday, the final day of the gathering, will be given over to seeing the sights and a picnic at Germania park in the afternoon.

RECIPES.

Onion and Cucumber Soup.  
Peel and cut in thin slices crosswise two good-sized onions and three cucumbers. Cover with one pint of boiling water and one pint of real or chicken stock, and simmer very slowly for one hour; then rub through a sieve,

pressing hard so as to obtain as much of the pulp as possible. Return to the fire to keep hot. In a double boiler scald one pint of milk and stir into it one tablespoonful of butter and two tablespoonfuls of flour rubbed together to a paste. When thick and smooth add the strained soup, season to taste, simmer five minutes and serve with croutons.

Asparagus Fricassee.  
One bunch of asparagus, one large or two small heads of lettuce, half a dozen sprays of watercress, one teaspoonful of chopped parsley, salt and pepper to taste and one lump of sugar. Scrape and wash the asparagus and boil in slightly salted water until tender. In a saucepan melt one tablespoonful of butter, add one tablespoonful of flour and one scant pint of water in which the asparagus was boiled. Cut the asparagus in small bits and add it to the sauce with the lettuce torn into small pieces, the cress, parsley and sugar. Simmer for fifteen minutes, add one teaspoonful of lemon juice, season to taste and serve.

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
