

"THE COVERED WAGON" PROVES TO BE AS BIG AS ALL OUTDOORS

Halting between the immensity of the thing itself and the loveliness of Lois Wilson in a poke bonnet (or is it a sun bonnet?) it is pretty rather difficult to go to the pleasing task of describing "The Covered Wagon."

This as everybody knows is one of the big moving productions of all time. The least fanatical of movie fans could tell without any difficulty the two or three pictures that may be ranked higher than it in the scale of artistic achievement. I was going to start out on the theme "As big as all outdoors," because that is the way the picture struck me. James Cruze, the director, had a big canvas on which to paint it. He had the immensity of the west for his easel. But then, I thought of the beauty of Lois Wilson and was minded to put her in the foreground. In any event these two impressions are the lasting ones the picture made.

Of course there are the romantic Warren Kerrigan, that wonderful

character actor Ernest Torrence the almost equally talented Tully Marshall, the veteran Charles Ogle and Johnny Fox, a remarkable boy actor, if personalities should predominate.

But they do not in this picture. It is an epic of the west translated to the screen.

"The Covered Wagon" has been adapted from Emerson Hough's splendid romance of the winning of the West. It is a Famous Players-Lasky production and most of the credit for this masterpiece is due to James Cruze, who directed it. For 3 months 3,000 actors, including 1,000 Indians, had their camp in the Utah desert, 80 miles from a railroad. They endured sandstorms and blizzards and on several occasions when the supply wagons were delayed, they even went hungry. The hardships endured by the actors has done much toward making the picture ring true.

The Indian fight, the buffalo hunt, the fording of the Platte river, the prairie fire, are among the thrilling events which marked the 2,000-mile journey across the country. There were 500 covered wagons which started on the long trail from Westport Landing (now Kansas City) in 1843, but not one-third of the number reached Oregon. Many turned back, while others turned southward and went to California when news of the '49 gold-strike reached the pioneers.

The spectacle is bound to be affected by the evidence of lavish expenditure in making the picture. The Famous Players-Lasky company probably spent enough to outfit a small war. They had to get together hundreds of wagons, horses, mules, cattle, actors, Indians. They had to outfit them with historical accuracy. They had to provision this army for months and almost literally follow the trail that was followed by the daring band of Oregon-seeking pioneers in the historical event on which the story is based.

The production here is accompanied by an orchestra of 20 pieces which plays the incidental score in a manner that heightens the illusion at all times. This music is brought out of the past. It is made up of the old songs of the days of '49 and is one of the many striking proofs of the historical fidelity of the picture. "The Covered Wagon" will be seen again afternoon and evening today and tomorrow at the Opera House.—L. P. C.

HIGH IN SAFETY, YET U. S. SHOWS MOST ACCIDENTS

Safety Head Reveals Paradox Due To Beginning In Accident Prevention

Chicago.—"America presents the anomalous situation of being the most advanced nation in accident prevention, and at the same time having the highest accident rate on earth."

Thus does William H. Cameron, managing director of the National Safety Council, sum up the efforts of safety advocates in this country to educate workmen toward greater care in their work.

The reason for the paradox, he says, lies in the beginning of a prodigious movement for safety.

"It takes time to develop the safety habit in individuals," he replies.

"Safety consists only 25 per cent in the shield around the buzz saw and 75 per cent in the cautious brain and habits of the worker."

Yet this fundamental idea of industrial accident avoidance is realized by less than one-tenth of one per cent of the workers in this country, and by an almost imperceptible few abroad, Cameron estimates.

But the United States is taking the lead in safety.

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DRY AGENTS WORK ON MILWAUKEE BARS WITH GOOD SUCCESS

Milwaukee, Wis., March 4.—Conducting a surprise attack on Milwaukee establishments, state prohibition officers in raids here last night obtained evidence of illegal possession of liquor in several saloons after raiding seventeen bars.

Warrants for the arrest of the proprietors of the places in which liquor was found will be issued today, the dry officials announced.

The wholesale raids, part of a campaign of periodical cleanup of places suspected of violating the prohibition laws, followed a recent conference here of state agents from all parts of the state at the call of state prohibition director, Herman Sachtjen, five out of town agents took part in the raids. The men operated in two squads of three men each.

As far as could be learned here the state agents worked alone, Federal agents taking no part in the program.

Pending arrest of the saloonists involved, no names were made public.

Washington, March 3.—"In the making of gardens, is the making of the best American citizenship," said Mrs. John D. Sherman today in completing plans for the second garden week, April 20 to 26. Mrs. Sherman is chairman of the department of applied education and has been identified with club organization work for sixteen years.

"Last year 3,552 children did school garden work in New York City, where conditions are most adverse," continued Mrs. Sherman, who is Colorado's nominee for the federation presidency at the convention on June 2 in Los Angeles. "The produce raised was valued at \$33,000 by the school authorities. Other cities should greatly exceed this mark."

"Garden Week opens on April 20 and the churches are asked to cooperate, for there is many a golden text in garden work. Monday will be devoted to the landscape features and the backyard garden. Tuesday will take up the community garden idea. Wednesday is Bureau of Education Day, Thursday is demonstration day for the boys' and girls' clubs. Friday is scheduled for trees and wild flowers. The American Free Association of Washington will send out tree planting suggestions and tree day programs to schools. Saturday is for pageants, plays and exercises with appropriate moving pictures in the motion picture houses."
