Mrs. Rooney Again Heads M. A. C. W.

MRS. F. J. Rooney of this city, was re-elected president of the Green Bay division of the Missionary association of Catholics, women Friday afternoon at St. Norbert college, West De Pere. Miss Marie Sherman and Mrs. Samuel Foman, Chicago, formerly Miss Isabel Sherman of this city, attended the retreat which began on Monday and lasted through Friday. Mrs. Rooney was president at the retreat on Thursday and Friday.

Other officers elected were: vice president, Mrs. William Golden, Wrightstown; secretary, Mrs. Margaret T. Clark, Oshkosh; consultants, Mrs. George Borkhol, Green Bay, and Mrs. William Golden, Wrightstown. Mrs. Joseph Gockel, Milwaukee, president of the national organization, reported that receipts from the various branches reached a total of \$165,662 last year and \$149,959 was contributed to missions in the United States and foreign countries. Previous to the opening business session in the morning, the members attended a celebration of high mass in St. Joseph church. The abbey choir sang the mass. During the service the Rev. F. X. Exler, St. Norbert college, talked on missions, and the same priest, during a business session, said the association is too modest for one that can accumulate such a sum of money as officers reported. He said the association is entitled to feel proud of its record and perhaps "sell the world" a little more about what it is doing. Benediction followed the sermon.

The Rt. Rev. B. H. Pennings, abbot of St. Norbert abbey, opened the convention proper with prayer, and Mrs. Rooney welcomed the women. Speakers during the day, aside from the officers, were Abbot Pennings, Father Alphonse, Franciscan missionary who spent many years in China; the Rev. Father Huhn, Luxemburg; the Rev. Father Loeke, Shawano. Father Alphonse thanked the association for its donation of \$50,000 to a seminary at Stehne, China, the only one located in that part of China. He said he believed conditions in China are improving.

Resolutions, drawn up by a special committee, voiced an appeal to the Federal Radio commission to license Radio Station WHTB, owned and operated by St. Norbert college, and the resolutions were unanimously adopted.

Friday's convention followed a retreat, attended by 18 women, at the college. The Rev. F. X. Exler was the retreat master.
