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James Burrill Angell, LL. D.

ALL WHO are interested in the University have congratulated themselves so often in the past that the subject of this notice is its official head, and hope to congratulate themselves so many times in the future, that the selection of the twenty-fifth anniversary of his administration for a special celebration can only be accounted for by the deep respect that all true Americans feel for the decimal system, almost as deep as that which they feel for the Monroe doctrine. But any pretext is a grateful one for giving expression to the admiration we feel for his abilities and his way of using them, and to the affection we feel for the man.

He was born in Rhode Island in 1829, and was graduated from Brown University in 1849. His preparation for college had been obtained chiefly in Rhode Island schools and academies, part of it under Dr. Frieze, his predecessor in the

presidency of the University of Michigan. Not long after graduation, it was thought that his health would make an outdoor life necessary, and he began the study of civil engineering, but toward the close of 1851 he gave it up and started for Europe.

Here he remained for nearly two years, and when he returned in 1853 he took up the duties of professor of modern languages and literatures at Brown University, a position which had been offered him during his absence. If he had not done so many other things so well, I should be tempted to say that nature had meant him to be a college professor, and certainly that was one of the things she meant him for. Admirable in scholarship, lucid in exposition, requiring solid work from his students, unflinching in his candor, his courtesy, his gentleness, he combined in an unusual degree the instructor and the educator.

He took great delight in his work, and would not have given it up, even for a short time, if he had not thought it his duty. He had shown his mettle by numerous articles in the *Providence Journal*, the leading paper of Rhode Island, and when the presidential campaign of 1860 showed the dangers threatening us from the secession spirit in the South, he resigned his professorship to take the editorship in chief of the *Journal*. During the six years that he filled this position, the most stirring years in our history since the Revolution, he did admirable service for the cause he loved. It is fair to presume also that the contact with men and affairs during these six years increased in him that inborn aptitude for dealing with actual conditions, that capacity for seeing things as they are and making the best of them, which has been such an important element in his success as President of our University.

But he was glad to return to college work when the immediate stress of conflict was over, when the problems that could be solved only by musket-shot and cannon-ball were to give way to those that needed rather a trained intellect, a wide knowledge, a cautious temper, a candid judgment. So when the presidency of the University of Vermont was offered to him, he accepted and served five years with such marked success that when the Regents of the University of Michigan were looking for a successor to Dr. Haven, he was one of the first to be thought of, and on the second offer of the presidency by them, he accepted and was inaugurated in 1871.

It would be absurd to say that the extraordinary prosperity of the University since that date is due to him alone, but it would be equally absurd to doubt that his influence and activity are among the most important elements in it. His unusual gifts as a speaker have made him widely known throughout the state, and wherever known, the sweetness of his temper, the serenity of his judgments, the breadth of his sympathies, have gained him numerous friends. He is always

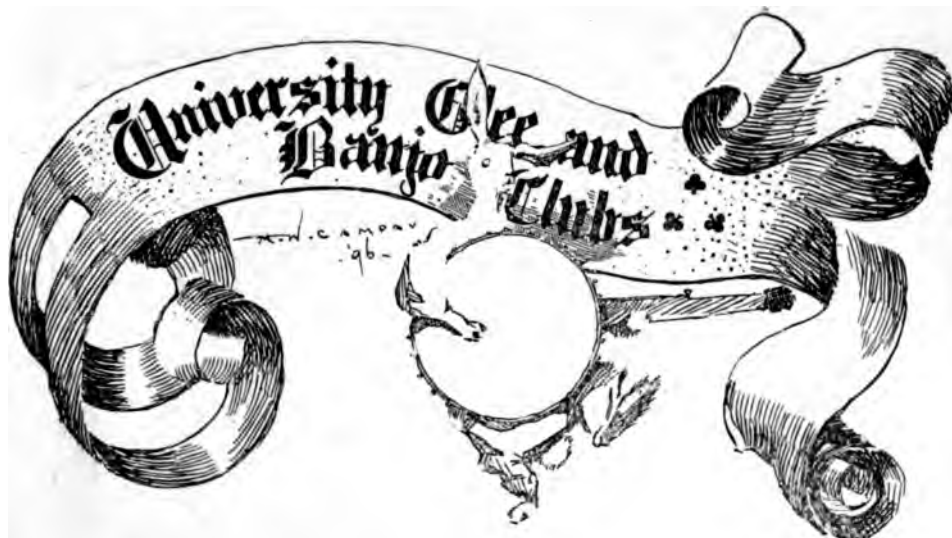
ready with sound advice and active aid to every movement to extend the usefulness and increase the efficiency of all educational institutions, but a wise conservatism saves him from approving every rash proposition made by earnest, but injudicious reformers.

To the students he is above all a friend, and many of them can testify to his efficient help; even to those whom it has become necessary to discipline, his severity in act has been tempered by indulgence in judgment. His eyes are kept well open for merit as for demerit, and the marked decrease in serious internal disturbance is certainly due him in large part.

Dr. Angell's service has been interrupted by two short periods, during which he held government appointments. In 1879 he was appointed Minister to China for the special purpose of negotiating a treaty to settle some pending questions between the two governments, and remained about a year after the unexpectedly quick and satisfactory settlement which he brought about. In 1887 he was appointed one of the commissioners to settle the fisheries question between the United States and Great Britain, and was absent for several months at Washington engaged in his duties as commissioner. The settlement which was negotiated was however rejected by the Senate.

But however great his services have been in various directions, his friends love to think of him best as a man, and here it is not becoming to speak of him as fully as would be pleasant. It is sufficient to say that the success of the man in his public life is abundantly explained by what can be seen in his private life. "*Nulli sorte . . . candidiore viri.*"

University Musical Society

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Brief Historical Sketch of the University Musical Society

THE history of the University Musical Society may be divided into two periods: 1st, from its first organization in 1880 to the resignation of Professor Calvin Cady in 1888; 2d, from the appointment of Professor A. A. Stanley in 1888 until the present time.

In the fall of 1879, there existed, as representing the musical culture in the town and University two organizations: the Choral Union, largely composed of Professors and Students, and the Students' Orchestra, named "The Sodality."

In February, 1880, on the proposition of Dr. W. S. Frieze, these organizations combined under the name of the University Musical Society. Both kept their autonomy but worked harmoniously together in view of creating and developing a musical interest in the University and among the citizens. However their efforts did not meet with the anticipated success, for enthusiasm was sadly lacking in and out of the Society. During the summer of 1881, on the suggestion of Professor Cady and Professor Frieze, the University Musical Society became a corporate body and assumed the direction of the two former organizations and the School of Music which was then created. The new plan caused a great dissatisfaction among the original members of the former University Musical Society, but nevertheless, the new Society began its work with hopes of success. The High School established a "Music Course," and arrangements were made to give a course of concerts each year. These concerts did not prove successful. The same lack of enthusiasm remained among the people. The financial failures of some concerts which the members and directors had to make good, did not increase this enthusiastic spirit; so the one Society went on day after day, struggling without life; the Students'

Orchestra died out in 1884, the School of Music was simply alive and the Choral Union had hardly more than thirty or forty members. Finally, in 1888, Professor Cady, thoroughly disheartened, presented his resignation and went to Chicago where he had a call. The Choral Union, now reduced to twenty-five or thirty members had almost decided to disband. It seemed as if the purpose of the University Musical Society had entirely failed.

But the University Musical Society, i. e. the men who from the beginning had devoted their time, money and energy to the cause of music, had not given up the fight. These men were ready to try again and hoped to win the day.

In the Fall of 1888, Professor A. A. Stanley, of Providence, was called to take the place of Professor Cady. He felt very much discouraged when he found how matters stood, but he courageously went to work to build anew on the ruins of the past. Soon he reorganized the Choral Union, that main spring of the University Musical Society, and in the Spring of 1889, on his proposition, sanctioned by the University Musical Society, the new plan of "The Series of Choral Union Concerts" was inaugurated.

On the other hand, finding that the School of Music was not properly managed, Professor Stanley resigned his Directorship. This was the death-blow of the school. But his idea was not to abandon the field; he simply waited for an opportunity to start the School on a better footing. So, in the spring of 1890, the University Musical Society, on his recommendation, tried to reorganize the school under a more immediate control of the University. Part of the recommendations to the Faculty were adopted by it, but the main point remained unsettled, i. e., to establish a School of Music, whose teachers should be recommended by the University Musical Society and appointed by the Regents on the University roll without pay; such teachers being entitled to teach the higher grades of Music to students, giving credits counting toward degrees; also to request the Regents to ask the Legislature for an Art Building. The Regents did not favor the scheme. The Society made another attempt in that direction and failed again. Then it turned towards the citizens and sought the co-operation of the Business Men's Association. This time it succeeded. The arrangement was made by which the citizens would become subscribers to a guarantee fund provided they had representation on the Board. The amount of each share was \$65, payable in two years—it was expected that by that time the School would pay for itself. Then, rooms were rented in the Students' Christian Association Building, competent teachers were engaged, instruments were purchased and the University School of Music was opened in October, 1892, with every prospect of success. During that time the Choral Union series of Concerts had met with favor, the attendance growing larger every time; chamber concerts were given and well patronized.

Before the year was ended, it was found that the accommodations for the School of Music had become inadequate. So the Society applied again to the business men, and they promptly answered the call. They formed a stock company known as the Building Association, in which the former guarantees were included. They built the present School of Music, purchased the organ, and rent the building to the University Musical Society, which is to pay the interest when it is able to do it, and have the right to purchase the building when it feels ready. The building was properly dedicated in November, 1893, and the hall dedicated as a Memorial Hall, in honor of Dr. H. S. Frieze.

I have said that one of the conditions for the support of the citizens was that they should be represented on the Board. To accomplish this, it became necessary that some of the present Directors should resign. The following gentlemen graciously and generously made that sacrifice: Professor W. W. Beman, Dr. W. H. Dorrance, Messrs. C. C. Benedict, P. T. Ross and A. H. Hopkins. The new Board was made as follows:

The progress of this second period was saddened by the death of the first two Presidents of the Society, Dr. H. S. Frieze and Prof. Alex. Winchell, who died, the former in December 1889, before he could have seen the fulfillment of his hopes; the other, in January, 1891, keeping until his last breath his interest and love for the success of the Society. They were a great loss to the Society.

Again in the Spring of 1894, the Society met with another great loss in the person of Mr. A. L. Noble, who had been so energetic in securing the co-operation of the business men and had proved to be a most valuable member of the Board. His vacancy was filled by Major Stevens.

Dr. H. S. Frieze, in his early talks with me had always expressed his great regret that there was no organ to fill the back of the stage in the University Hall.

It cannot be wondered then that the Society on hearing that the great Columbian Organ, built for the Chicago Fair, by Messrs. Farrand & Votey, could be bought, purchased it and presented it to the Regents as a memorial to Dr. Frieze. The presentation was made with appropriate ceremony on December, 1894. Professor A. A. Stanley was at the organ, and who had better right to occupy that place of honor than he!

In the Spring of that year, on account of the depression in business, tickets for the Choral Union concerts were not sold as readily as before, and the Society found itself facing a probable large deficit. Already, the year before, the expenses had exceeded the receipts, owing to the Chicago Fair. After considering several plans, the Society, on the suggestion of Professor Stanley, concluded to inaugurate a "May Festival." The scheme was successful, so much, so that at the second Festival, in 1895, the affluence of visitors was such that there was no standing room left and many unfortunately had to be turned away. Single tickets were sold as high as \$5.00, and even above. The Society was entirely taken by surprise and determined to use all its energy to provide accommodations for a larger attendance. But alas! it has no money, and though it has the plans, it cannot build. And yet there is needed an auditorium of 5000 seats, in which the Society could give such performances as the May Festival, Seidel's Orchestra, and Damrosch's Operas, to which it could invite all the friends of music. Let us hope that some generous movement will start among the friends of the Society and lovers of music to enable the Society to realize this last need.

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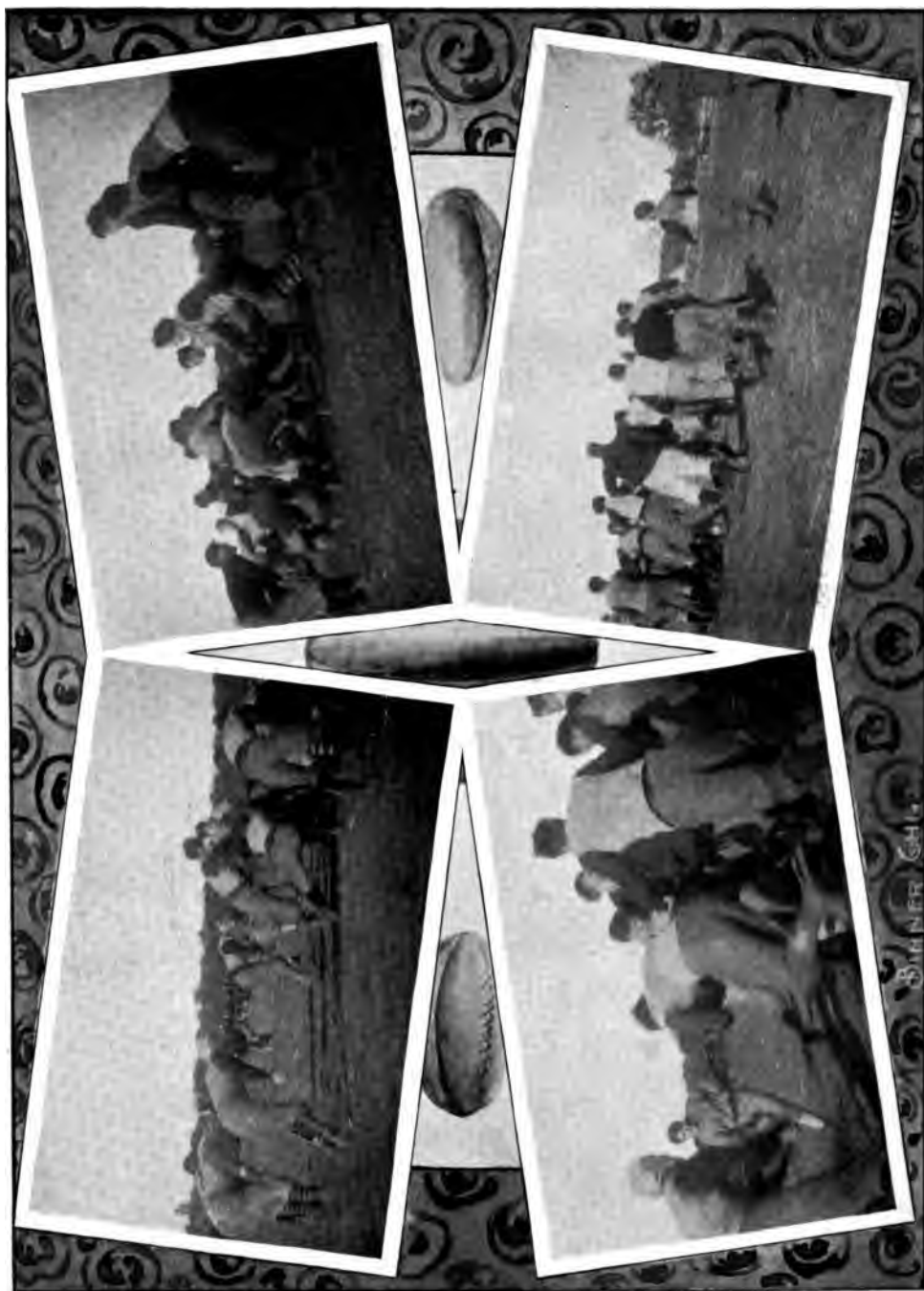

The Football Season of 1895

IN '94, after many weeks of toil and preparation, we met and defeated Cornell—not lightly and gently, but thoroughly and completely. We sent her home feeling a trifle more melancholy than when she came, but evidently much wiser, for she could not find time to arrange the usual series this year. And there was much enthusiasm and the bubblings of joy were heard in Detroit and on the campus. There were bonfires.

And we thought then that we were near the promised land of football perfection, but last season's results changed that idea. Even last season we were forced to see again the folly of imagining things. We had a deep seated conviction that there was nothing in the heavens above or the earth beneath or the waters under the earth, that could even make the pace for us in the race for the Western pennant—Purdue negated that. And so it is with extreme caution that I remark, in tones properly modulated to the doubtful nature of the proposition, that I do not think Michigan's record of '95 is likely to be surpassed for some years to come, but I dare to hope that the brawny boys of '96 will add new records and greater glory to our football annals. There is one proposition, however, which may be advanced with more certainty—certainty to a common intent in general, let us say—and that is that the season of '95 was one great tidal wave of success, and in that year Michigan, as a blushing debutante, made her bow to the country at large and claimed a place as a first-class expert in modern football. Hitherto our greatest games had been with Western teams. True we had beaten Cornell and Cornell had played a close game with one of the Eastern colleges, therefore we were mighty and must prevail. But this year we went ourselves into the distant and holy places of the East and personally conducted our coming out ball on Soldiers Field—well named for the occasion, though Battle Creek would have been better perhaps, for the battle was there and the creek too, for that matter, of mud and water. And here we proved to the full satisfaction of the Boston

Press that we were farmers, miners, cutthroats, thugs and garroters, and to the reasonable people of the country that the men who came out of the West knew one or two games besides mumblepeg and marbles.

* * * * *

In days of old a seer lived, and, looking into the future with all discerning vision, he proclaimed that a time would come when Michigan would take that place in the college world, to which by reason of her numbers and her merits she was so justly entitled. They cried out upon him and spake of chestnuts, but it has come to pass even as the seer foretold.

A glance at the subjoined list will show what wrought the change. It is an almost colorless record of continuous victories with but one break. Michigan's goal line was crossed three times, once by Harvard, twice by Purdue. The Harvard defeat was a virtual victory. It was and is the opinion of those best qualified to judge that, given equal conditions, Michigan would have won. We had traveled twenty-four hours by rail and rested less than two days before going on the field, we had changed drinking water and diet, we played before some thousands of Harvard sympathizers (though they displayed an impartial appreciation of the good plays of either side, and acted throughout in a thoroughly gentlemanly manner) and finally we played

in the rain and on wet and slippery ground, conditions entirely new to us. And so they won, and, even as to that, there were not wanting whispers that without a fortuitous accident—however, post-mortems are always distasteful. Let us accept the fact that we were beaten, and record our intention of turning the tables next year. It is poor policy to belittle a successful antagonist. Better exalt him for the supreme skill he displayed in winning from such a foe, and so honor yourself,

The discomfiture of Purdue might be as easily and as satisfactorily explained, but what's the use? Every one knows how we played a lot of substitutes and regulars battered in the recent Harvard game, and how we played under rules different from those we had been using—and changing rules isn't as easy as changing sweaters. Perhaps every one does not however realize another fact of some importance, and that is that Purdue also played football, the best we met in the West. It is a matter of congratulation that the game was as close as it was, for Michigan was enabled to display that magnificent "brace," which will be sung for years to come. The last five minutes of the Purdue game were worth most of the other games of the season put together. It was exhilarating to note how when

Villa took the ball and plunged through the Purdue line as the beautiful lady in the circus jumps through paper hoops, the rest of the Michigan men slouched down the field, crushing and driving everything before them by sheer muscle and determination.

It is not gracious to pick out a few men for special mention where all are so deserving. The men at the training table showed in general, I am informed by

those whose business it was to know, a strict regard for the rules of training, a ready obedience and a cheerful disposition throughout the season. These are three requisites of a good team. If to any one man above another credit is due for this result, McCauley should receive it. Not only his splendid coaching, but his quiet, gentlemanly, kindly manner, his forbearance, and his abstention from the use of language too strong for the public prints, all had their good effect upon the team. And certainly he would have found it hard to get such excellent support from any

three other men as he got from Fitzpatrick, Henninger and Baird. They have all won the high regard of the entire University and the sincere liking of those who have come in personal contact with them.

It seems that next year the reins of control will be held by equally strong and willing hands. After election some one was heart to say that "le roi est Mort," (these football men are so bright!), which signified, being translated, that Mr. Senter had been made captain, and Captain Henninger has found a worthy successor. Buck Richards has been put in Charlie Baird's place, Mr. Ward of Princeton fame will coach, and "Fitz" will succeed himself. With these four men in charge of affairs, a number of the old players coming back, good new material promised, and a new born college spirit to back the team, the prospects for '96 are indeed bright.

“THE UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN ASSOCIATION OF DETROIT” is the name of the youngest of the many Alumni Associations of the University of Michigan. As a matter of history it should be recorded that the preliminary committees were appointed by the under-graduates of the University, who, in defiance of all class distinctions, determined to organize the Alumni of Detroit, and, presto, the Alumni were organized.

The preliminary organization and election of officers took place October 31st, 1895, at a general meeting called by the following committee: Dr. Edwin S. Sherrill, chairman; Levi L. Barbour, Albert M. Henry, Edward W. Pendleton, Bryant Walker, Joseph R. McLaughlin, John M. Hinchman, William C. Johnson, William A. Butler, Frederick K. Stearns, J. M. Brewer, Stanley D. McGraw, Charles T. Miller, Paul F. Bagley, George P. Codd, Byron S. Waite, Eli R. Sutton, Frederick T. Ducharme, Henry G. Field, and Earl D. Babst. The meeting was called to order by Albert M. Henry, and was the most enthusiastic gathering of Detroit Alumni held in recent years. Hon. William A. Moore was chosen Chairman, and Edward W. Pendleton, Secretary. A constitution of liberal terms was adopted providing for the promotion of the best interests of the University, the cultivation of friendly relation among the members, and for the holding of an annual banquet.

The officers elected at this meeting under the constitution were, Don M. Dickinson, President; Ruth Winifred Lane, Vice-President; Earl D. Babst, Secretary-Treasurer; Judge Henry H. Swan, William C. Johnson, Clarence M. Burton, George P. Codd, Dr. Helen F. Warner, and Judge George S. Hosmer, Directors.

TO WRITE a history of a class during the four years of its existence is no light matter. Nor does the task become less difficult when it is required to compress into one or two small pages a record crowded with important and glorious events. Our embarrassment would be unbearable if we had not discovered in one short sentence the entire story of the class of Ninety-six. It is that trite message that Cæsar sent to the Roman Senate:—*Veni, vidi, vici*. This was not truer of Cæsar than it is of ourselves. We came, we saw, we conquered.

And first, "We came"—

This suggests a place to come *from* as well as a place to come *to*. From no less than twenty different States, stretching from New Hampshire to California; from a land not less distant than the southernmost part of Africa itself, the sons of Ninety-six crowded to her ranks. From cities varying in size from Philadelphia and Chicago down to Oshkosh and Romeo; from points as far north as St. Paul and Duluth, to as far south as Peru (Illinois) Ninety-six drew her recruits. Thus she united in herself that healthful mixture of blood and temperament that might be expected from the fusion of a Minnesota Eskimo and a Hottentot from Cape Town.

Next, "We saw"—

We saw a great university offering great incentives to achievement. We saw honor to be won in athletics, in oratory, in musical circles, as well as in the less important matters of scholarship.

And last, "We conquered"—

In athletics Ninety-six at once assumed a forward position, and has with little difficulty maintained her precedence against all comers. In the first year the Sophomore-Freshman Field Day and the 'Varsity Field Day surrendered to our skill and prowess. In the second year the same two contests were again waged in our favor. In the third year the 'Varsity Field Day for a third time yielded us the greatest number of honors. At the same time

we enjoyed the distinction of possessing the class championship in both baseball and foot-ball. Nor did we rest until we had supplied a captain to the 'Varsity Track Team, and another to the 'Varsity Foot-Ball Team that won such honor and applause in the game against Cornell. In the fourth year our reputation has become so well established that success is no longer necessary to secure our position. In oratory '96 has supplied the University with a champion who showed his worth at the Northern Oratorical Contest, held at Madison, Wisconsin, where he easily bore off first honors. To the University Glee, Banjo, and Mandolin Clubs '96 has supplied no less than twenty-four members.

Many more conquests might be mentioned of a more tender but not less chivalrous nature,—the victories that have been ours not less in winning the affection of our fair companions in college than in resisting their subtle charms. Which has been the harder, or rather which has been the easier it does not become us to venture. How many of the fair band have already laid down their hearts at the feet of Ninety-six, the love-god alone can tell. We cannot linger to trace our influence in the steady progress that the University has undergone since our arrival. Waterman gymnasium, the great Columbian organ, Tappan Hall, the Lewis art collection, to say nothing of the *Wrinkle*, have appeared during our career. We must now withdraw to give place to the class of 1900. It is with confidence that after we are gone, Michigan will continue her rapid advance among American colleges that we go forth to show what she has already done for one of her most loyal and enthusiastic classes. With mingled feelings of regret and happiness '96 raises high the cup and with one heart and one voice unites:

“Hurrah for the Yellow and Blue!”

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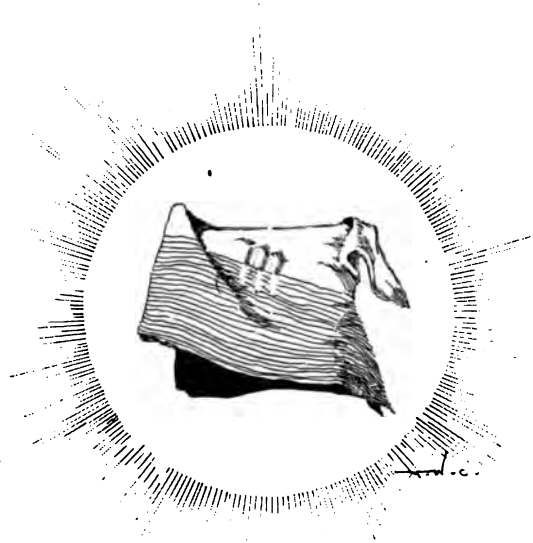
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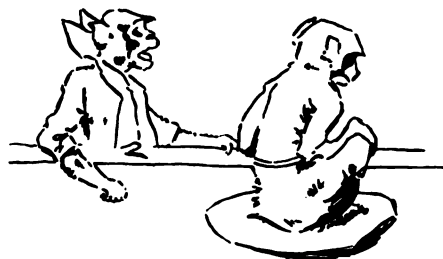
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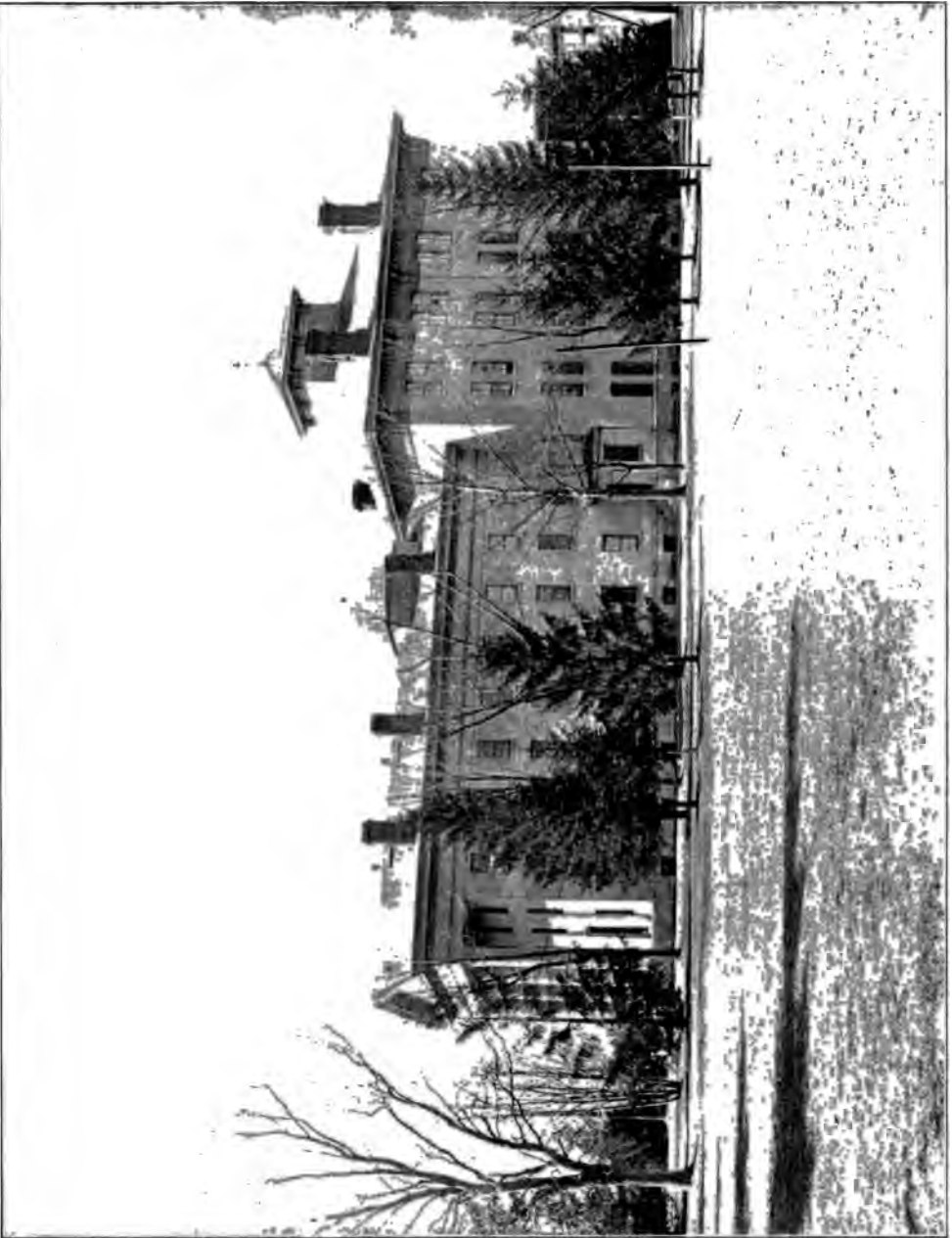


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DURING the past few years the Engineering Department has assumed such importance in the University that, at the beginning of the present college year, it was made a separate department.

"Where's Jim Prentiss now," asked Joe Parker as he came in with more beer.

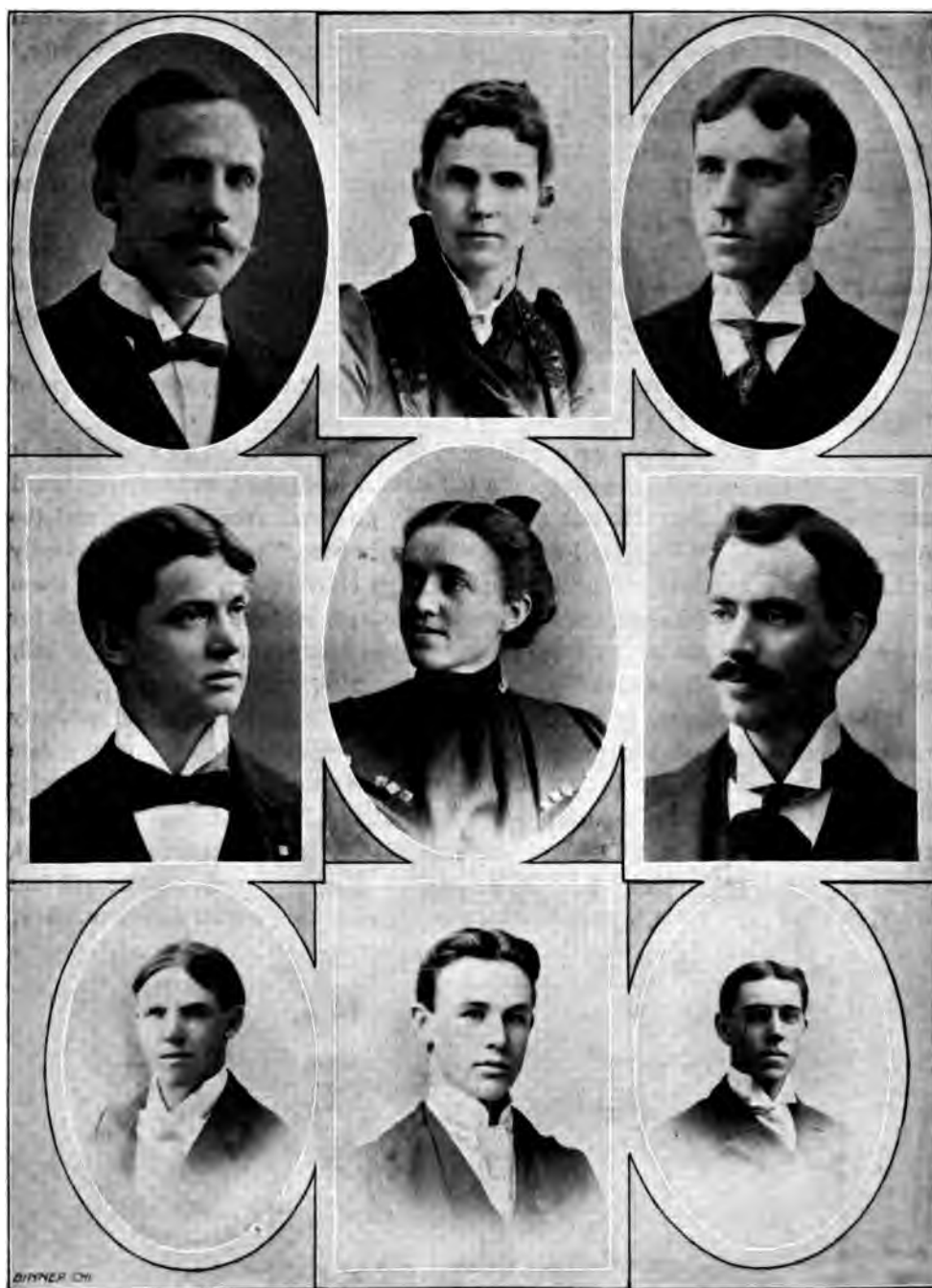
