HOPKINS ACTIVE ABOUT HOUSE

He Personally Greets Senators and Representatives.

STORY INVOLVING CULLOM

Report That Senator Only Half-Heartedly Supports the Junior-Bill to Prevent Irregular Financial Transactions Introduced by Ap Madoc—Another Measure Makes Marriage Illegal for the Man Who Gets Intoxicated Twice a Year.

Springfield, Ill., Feb. 25.—Before the thirty-sixth joint ballot for the senatorship was taken Senator Hopkins was personally active about the house, coming into the chamber and shaking hands with the representatives and senators. His friends say he has prepared for a long siege.

The thirty-sixth ballot stood: Hopkins, 61; Stringer, 41; Henry Duggan, 19; Foss, 17; Shuttle, 17; Mason, 1; Sherman, 2; Lowden, 1; A. J. Sabath, 1.

The attendance was light, and the blight of "poison" continued to rest upon Hopkins. Eight votes were lost to the senator in this way.

Lowden's Friends Active.

New indications of senatorial activity in the interests of Congressman Frank O. Lowden were seen. The belief that he may succeed Hopkins is so strong in his district, the Thirtieth, that Senator J. C. McKenzie, who is considered one of the staunch Hopkins men, is reported to be looking over the district to ascertain his prospects for succeeding Lowden in the lower branch of congress.

Admirers of Edwin S. Conway of Chicago, who had planned to put his name before the assembly, held back believing that greater impetus could be given the movement a little later. Indications that Senator Shelby M. Cullom is not more than lukewarm in his desire to have Senator Hopkins defeated is seen by Hopkins' foes in a story circulated about Springfield.

Dixon Still Holds Place.

It was reported that Hopkins had demanded of Judge Bethea the removal of Henry S. Dixon, a Democrat, as referee in bankruptcy in the northern district. This request Judge Bethea, it is reported, denied, and then he went to New Orleans for a vacation. Rumor has it that he will not return.

were said to be back of the demand for Dixon's removal and to have indicated to Hopkins that his support would be more enthusiastic from that territory were the proper Republican put in that place. Judge Bethea is understood to have appointed Dixon as referee because of personal friendship. The judge is considered distinctly a Cullom man.

Ap Madoc's Financial Bill.
A measure to prevent such operations as are alleged to have preceded recent Chicago failures was introduced by Representative Ap Madoc. Ap Madoc has given much study to drafting the bill, which, it is understood, has the approval of the Chicago Clearing House association. It aims directly at the making of false statements upon which credit may be obtained from banks, making the cashier, agent or employee liable to prosecution and punishment, as well as the principal.

The punishment for putting up warehouse receipts for grain which is not in warehouse is to be increased to a fine of \$2,000, or not more than ten years in prison, and the person directly hypothecating the receipt, even though for his firm, is made liable to prosecution.

Bad For Drinking Men.
Representative J. Groves introduced a measure amending the marriage laws of the state by declaring an habitual drunkard incapable of contracting marriage and defining an "habitual drunkard" to be a person who becomes intoxicated twice in a year; providing also that applicant's for marriage licenses shall make affidavit that they have not been intoxicated twice in the preceding year.

Ap Madoc introduced also the Cook county civil service bill, vouched for by the Civil Service Reform association, at the request of Edgar T. Robertson, its secretary. The bill is identical with the one introduced at the last session after long consideration by Chicago citizens, including Edward J. Brundage, then president of the board of county commissioners, and Elton Lower, then president of the board of county civil service commissioners. Senator Lundberg will introduce the same measure in the senate today.

Concerning "Made" Ground.
A joint resolution to investigate titles of land along Lake Michigan and the navigable waters of Illinois, and to look especially into the holdings of the Illinois Steel company and the Illinois Central railroad, the Streeterville tract in Chicago, holdings of the Knickerbocker Ice company on some of the lakes of the state and those of hunting and fishing clubs, was passed by the house and early action is expected by the senate.

The commission authorized in the resolutions, which were offered by B. M. Chipperfield of Fulton, is to be composed of six representatives appointed by

by Speaker Shuttle and four senators appointed by Lieutenant Governor Oglesby. The attorney general is requested to give legal advice and \$10,000 is appropriated for expenses.

An apparent test of strength between the "old guard" and "younger" Republicans came in the senate on the presentation of the Chipperfield resolution.

In the face of sturdy opposition, headed by Senator Jones, chairman of the steering committee, and Senator Dunlap, senate floor leader, the resolution was adopted on motion of Senator Gardner, leader of the old guard, while Lieutenant Governor Oglesby pounded the desk with his gavel and Senator Dunlap called in vain for recognition.

"I move concurrence in the resolution," said Senator Gardner when it had been read.

"I would suggest, rather, that it lie over one day under the rules," said Senator Jones. "I don't know what the purpose of the bill is."

"All I know is what it says," said Senator Gardner. "Chipperfield said he'd like to have us concur."

"There is no rule by which a house message must lie over," ruled Oglesby. Then Senator Jones changed the form of his motion. "I move the resolution be made a special order for tomorrow," he said.

Senator Henson objected, saying that he was going away tomorrow and the vote was taken amid Senator Dunlap's calls for recognition.

For Regulation of Osteopaths.
A roar of ayes was heard from the favoring senators, but the noes apparently were louder.

"The motion is lost," said Oglesby. Senator Gardner's motion to concur was then put amid a considerable uproar.

"The motion is carried," declared the lieutenant governor. "The senate will proceed to the house."

A state board of examiners for osteopaths, with registration of all practitioners of that school, is provided for in a bill (S. B. 214) introduced by Senator Downing.

Senator Brown of Chicago introduced a bill providing that no license shall be granted to saloons within 250 feet of a church, school or hospital.

A bill by Senator Clark (S. B. 216) provides that municipalities or corporations controlling bathing beaches bordering upon public waters may extend such lands by building breakwaters or in other ways which shall not conflict with navigation.

Other bills introduced were: Senate bill 212, by Humphrey, establishing a new scale of fees for county clerks; senate bill 213, by Hall, providing for the licensing and regulating of hotels and rooming houses; senate bill 217, by Lande, giving the public administrator jurisdiction in all cases where a non-resident dies intestate.

Other House Bills.
Among the bills introduced in the house were:

House bill 179, by King, providing for three additional days of registration for voters in cities which have adopted registration law.

House bill 179, by Holaday, providing for the creation of a county textbook commission which shall have the power to select the school text books to be used in the schools of the county and establishing a uniform text book rule in each county.

House bill 175, by Glade, providing for the appropriation of \$250,000 for the erection of a new armory for the Second regiment, Illinois national guard, at Chicago and for the sale of the present armory.

House bill 180, by Lane, providing for the appropriation of \$150,000 for the erection of an armory for the Eighth regiment, Illinois national guard, at Chicago.

House bill 183, by Ton, providing for the abolishment of capital punishment and substituting for it imprisonment for life.

Senate bills 42 and 53 were reported to the house as having passed the senate. Senate bill 42 increases the salary of the insurance superintendent from \$3,000 to \$5,000 a year. Senate bill 53 authorizes life insurance companies organized under the laws of Illinois to reinsure their risks only in companies authorized to do business in Illinois.

Senate bill 37, appropriating \$15,000 for the committee expenses of the Forty-sixth general assembly, was read a second time and ordered engrossed for third reading.

SUFFRAGETTES SENT TO JAIL

Refused to Give Security for Future Good Behavior.

CELLS FOR PROMINENT WOMEN

Lady Constance Lytton, Sister of Lord Lytton and Daughter of the Former Viceroy of India, Threatens to Repeat Her Offense if Her Friends Secure Her Release from Imprisonment—Most of the Sentences Imposed Are for One Month.

London, Feb. 26.—Women suffragists who were arrested while attempting to reach Premier Asquith to present to him a petition in the interests of the cause were sentenced to imprisonment after they refused to give security for their future good behavior.

Most of the terms were for one month. Exceptions were made in the cases of Mrs. Pethick Lawrence and Miss Lawless, who, having previous convictions against them, were sentenced to two months' imprisonment.

Lady Constance Lytton, sister of Lord Lytton and daughter of the former viceroy of India, warned her friends that if they secured her release by providing security she would repeat her offense.

Sentences were imposed upon about thirty women, including in addition to the foregoing, Miss Stratford Dugdale, daughter of Commander Dugdale and cousin of the Hon. William R. W. Peel, who was elected in a by-election as a member of the house of commons for Taunton; Miss Solomon, daughter of the ex-premier of Cape Colony, and Mrs. Catherine Elizabeth Corbett, an aristocratic supporter of the movement.

All these women are of high social standing. Sympathizers gathered in the streets and there were frequent clashes with the police, who sought to keep them from the court.
