SWITCH AND SEMAPHORE

MATTERS CONCERNING STEAM AND ELECTRIC LINES.

An installment of items sidetracked for inspection.

What will be the first transcontinental passenger service in American railway history will be established April 4 by the Wabash, in connection with the Union Pacific. Final arrangements for the service were made at a joint conference of Wabash and Union Pacific passenger traffic officials at the Jefferson hotel in St. Louis Thursday.

Service between Boston, New York and St. Louis will be maintained by Wabash fast mail train No. 9, leaving here at 1:20 p. m. From St. Louis west service will be supplied by a new steel equipment of observation sleeping cars and chair cars, electrically lighted and steam heated, now building at the Pullman works. This train will leave St. Louis at 2:30 p. m. Under the schedule prepared at the joint conference, passengers will reach Kansas City at 9:55 o'clock the same night. Denver at 5:20 o'clock the next afternoon, and San Francisco, Los Angeles and Portland at 8 o'clock the evening of the third day.

The route will be the shortest in existence between the east and Pacific coast cities. The route is practically the same as that of the Overland Limited and the Los Angeles Limited. From the east to Kansas City the tracks of the Wabash will be used; from Kansas City to Ogden, Utah, the Union Pacific; from Ogden to Salt Lake City the Oregon Short Line; from Green River to Portland, Ore., the Oregon Short Line and the Oregon Railroad and Navigation Company; from Ogden, Utah, to San Francisco, the Southern Pacific, and from Salt Lake City to Los Angeles the San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake railroad.

East bound the train will leave San Francisco and Los Angeles at 10 o'clock in the morning and Portland at 9 o'clock in the morning, arriving in St. Louis to make connection with Wabash Train No. 2 for the east, leaving St. Louis at 8:30 p. m.

Politics in Nameoki.

Nameoki township republicans are preparing to put a partisan ticket in the field this year and a call has been issued for precinct meetings for Saturday night. Delegates will be selected at these meetings to the township convention which will be held probably Wednesday night of next week, when a ticket of republican township candidates will be selected. There will be about twenty-five delegates entitled to attend the township convention and it is expected that the affair will be entirely harmonious. Heretofore politics has not entered into the arrangement until after the office had been secured.
