## LORIMER'S WORD FOR DEMOCRATS

New Senator Says He Will Show Appreciation.

## CAREFULLY PLANNED FIGHT

Congressman Who Gets the Toga Formerly Worn by Hopkins States That While He Always Will Be a Republican He Will Find Some Way of Showing Members of the Opposite Party That Their Votes Were Given to a Man Who Knows the Meaning of Reciprocation.

Springfield, Ill., May 27.—William Lorimer, United States senator in the place of Albert J. Hopkins, says he wants the Democratic members of the general assembly who helped to elect him to know that he is a man to whom the word reciprocity has a meaning. He declares that while he always will be a Republican he will find some way to show those of the opposite party that their votes are appreciated thoroughly. Always called a clever politician, Lorimer's victory shows the effect of highly skillful planning. The move that resulted in the shattering of the

deadlock was the outcome of weeks of well managed work. When the right moment came the statesman from the west side of Chicago gave the signal and with the certainty of well drilled soldiers executing a maneuver the senators and representatives placed in the pocket of the blonde congressman his ticket direct to the upper house in Washington.

## Once Drove a Street Car.

From wheeling salt in the basement of a Chicago packing house to the leadership of men in a great commonwealth; from a horse car to a seat in the United States senate, is the span which measures the political life of William Lorimer. The son of a poor immigrant, he has realized all the possibilities offered by American citizenship to the foreign born. His father was English.

Asked how it was that Lorimer retained the loyal support of so many men, a friend replied:

"His life is clean, his habits are clean, his language is clean. Unlike many of the present-day politicians, he always answers you 'yes' or 'no' on any proposition you place before him and when he answers you he lives up to that answer. He is an honest man. He is an ideal citizen."

Lorimer is a family man. He is a home-lover. Mr. and Mrs. Lorimer are the parents of eight children. Their names are William, Jr., Leonard, Ethel, Loretta, Lorien, Marjorie, Helen and Lenora. Mrs. Lorimer was Miss Susan Mooney. She was married in 1884.

Politically, Lorimer's affiliations have been with the "stand-pat" element of the Republicans.

## Elected by 108 Votes.

Lorimer got under the wire with 108 votes.

It was the ninety-fifth ballot of the long contest, and when Lee O'Neill Browne, the minority leader, swung his forces into line for the Republican chief the friends of Lorimer were fairly beside themselves with joy. Not to be outdone by their rivals, the Sullivan faction of the Democrats, in spite of its recent declaration of purpose to stick to Lawrence B. Stringer, also forgot its partisanship and cast its votes for the Chicago congressman, perfecting a political amalgamation the like of which never before has been seen in this state.

Senator Hopkins said he would rather stand with Republican principles than to hold any office at a sacrifice of those principles. He referred to the primary battle and the plurality he got.

"I am glad," he said, "to hear Mr. Lorimer say that he will go to the senate as a Republican. A state which gave Mr. Taft a plurality of 160,000 votes should be represented by a Republican. I am sorry that he had to be elected by Democratic votes. I am opposed to bi-partisanship, as I believe this country must be ruled by political parties."

He thanked his supporters and said he retired to private life without regrets.

"I cast my vote for the broadest, fairest, ablest Republican I know, William Lorimer," said Senator E. J. Rainey of Cook, Democrat.

Senator Ball of Cook led the voting for Lorimer, followed by Senator Breidt, who spoke in explanation of his change from Congressman Form, for whom he had voted for ninety-four ballots. Contrary to expectation, the roll of the senate was called first in order to have Republicans cast the first votes for Lorimer. Senator Broderick was the first Democrat to vote for Lorimer.

Then Senator Isley of Jasper arose and scored the bi-partisan movement, amid the cheers of the Hopkins men. Senator Jones said:

"I believe any man who accepts the senatorship on a bi-partisan platform renders himself useless in the national government at Washington. A bi-partisan combination means that the minority party has something to expect. The man we send to Washington should not be so tied. He should have his hands free to uphold the acts and policies of President Taft and to represent in Washington the Republican party of the state of Illinois."

## Try to Put Out Northcott.

The greatest disorder was created following an effort to put out ex-Lieutenant Governor W. A. Northcott for lobbying.

On complaint of Representative Chipperfield a house policeman grappled roughly with Northcott at the rear of the house and began bawling him toward the door. "Object! Object!" and "Shame!" were the cries heard from several members.

Northcott was not ejected, but was taken to the door of the house and there released.

Minority Leader Lee O'Neill Browne was selected to lead the march in the house. He asserted that the speeches of Jones and Dailey were merely political talks.

"I was told to vote for Lorimer would mean my political destruction," said Representative Ap Madoe. "For years we have fought Lorimer in my territory. I took counsel with a number of my constituents who are known as eminent high-browed citizens, and they said they would prefer Mr. Lorimer to Mr. Hopkins."

The next exciting incident came when George English of Johnson scored his fellow Democrats in unparading language.

"You say, ah, yes, but you can't cash that speech," he shouted in the midst of his talk. "In the name of decency, what can you cash upon the floor of this house? Votes, gentlemen? Is it votes that you can cash here? I tell you that when some of you go home you will be chased from the boundaries of your districts with shot-guns."

Jacob Groves of Adams made further insinuations of improper activities preceding the final effort.

## Browne Denounces English.

Browne took the floor on a question of personal privilege. Turning bitterly toward English, who had made the bribery insinuations, Browne exclaimed with emphatic gestures:

"The gentleman from southern Illinois has made certain sharp remarks, evidently reflecting on the integrity of certain gentlemen. His charges were thinly veiled. I hope he did not mean what might be inferred. I do not know whether he referred to me or not. If he did I can hardly believe he did. I want here and now to denounce him as a liar and coward. I will add if he will step outside this hall and repeat the remarks he made, either he or I will never survive to utter any other remarks."

A committee from the house and senate was appointed to escort the senator-elect to the speaker's rostrum.

"I am today as I was yesterday," he said. "I am a Republican, standing on the platform of the Republican party."

However, Democrats and Republicans, he said, could unite in working for the deep waterway to the gulf. He pledged his best ability to Illinois.

Representative Hull moved that Senator Hopkins be escorted to the rostrum. The motion—a surprising one—was carried.

Representative Hull was made chairman of a committee of three. Hopkins took the rostrum. Speaker Shurtliff said in icy tones: "Albert J. Hopkins, former United States senator from Illinois."

Fifty-five Republicans and fifty-three Democrats voting together brought about Lorimer's election. Of the 55 Republicans, 13 are senate members and 42 are house members. Of the 53 Democrats, 6 are senate members and 47 are house members.
