

UNIONIST GAIN HAS REACHED HUNDRED MARK

Pronounced Turnovers Are Shown By Returns in Favor of Tories

GOVERNMENT COALITION GIVES TOTAL OF 276

Opposition Forces for Next Parliament, To Date, Number 217

LONDON, Jan. 22.—The Unionists place thirty-two seats to their credit out of the fifty-six contests of yesterday for members of parliament, the returns from which were received today.

The Liberals take twenty seats, the Nationalists three and the Laborites 1. The Unionist gains are nineteen and the Liberal losses are nine. The latter are the only gains the government has made during the past four days.

With yesterday's returns complete the state of the parties is:

Out of the fifty-six seats, the results of which are announced today, the Liberals in the last parliament held thirty-seven and the Unionists only 15.

Accordingly the change of opinion in these English counties in favor of the Tories, as shown by the turnover of seats, appears pronounced enough. The turnovers of from 2000 to 4000 votes from the Liberals to the Unionists are common.

ARCH-PRIEST OF REFORM.

Henry Chaplin, who was regarded as the arch-priest of tariff reform before Chamberlain took office, was re-elected for the Wiltshire division by more than 5200 majority. This is not so great as his previous majority, but Chaplin's opponent in 1907 was a woman suffragist, who was unable to poll a great part of the Liberal vote.

The tariff reformers also made a substantial increase on the Berkshire solid free trade ranks of Yorkshire. Three Yorkshire seats have been placed to the credit of the Unionists today, two of which were formerly held by Liberals.

An interesting member of the new parliament will be Francis Neilson, the Liberal candidate elected by the Hyde constituency of Cheshire. He was formerly state manager at the Covent Garden Theatre.

The twenty-four constituencies which are falling today were represented in the last parliament by nineteen Liberals, four Unionists and one Nationalist. In the contest for preponderant interest is in the Carmarthen district, where David Lloyd George, Chancellor of the Exchequer, and author of the budget which has caused the present struggle, is fighting hard for a substantial increase of the majority of 124 which he had in 1906.

ANOTHER MINISTER LOSSES.

Another minister was among today's defeated. Francis Dyke Acland, financial secretary to the war office, being defeated for the Richmond seat in Yorkshire, North Riding. Acland is the sixth minister defeated in the present election.

MORE SUITS ARE FILED.

UNDERTAKERS TO MAKE A BATTLE AGAINST CHARGE

City License Collector Wm. A. J. Franke, this afternoon swore out warrants for the arrest of eleven local undertakers for failure to pay the quarterly annual tax provided for in the city ordinance.

The undertakers refuse to meet the assessment on the grounds that it is class legislation and that other lines of business are not subjected to a similar law. Inspector Franke meets this argument with the statement that the present arrests are merely the first step in a crusade which will compel every line of business to pay a similar tax which has just been inaugurated.

The undertakers are named on the list of delinquents as: Marcus & Freeman, Howe Undertaking Company, Grant D. Miller, Beaudry & McAvoy, J. E. Henderson, James Taylor, Albert Brown Undertaking, Taylor, McMaister-Brisco, Gunna & Capogrina, P. A. Wolff, and the Schuler Undertaking Co. All have been released on \$25 bail and their trial set for Monday morning.

REFUSE SUBSTITUTES.

Meat Boycott Sweeps Nation Women Are Aroused to Battle

The crusade against the high prices of food is sweeping the country. Beginning in Cleveland, Ohio, less than a week ago, the movement has spread in both directions until it practically includes the leading cities of most of the States of the Union. The tempo of the people is reflected in the following summary:

NEW YORK—Million housewives to be asked by women's clubs to unite to force down prices of food; labor unions expected to join crusade.

CHICAGO—Beef packers alarmed at spread of the boycott and at government's threat of prosecution; laboring men joining the anti-meat propaganda.

PITTSBURGH—Labor unions boycott meat; union men who eat meat denounce as "scabs"; one man beaten; 75,000 anti-meat pledges signed.

SAN FRANCISCO—Committee for citizens' mass meeting urges direct sale of produce to householders, possibly a co-operative store.

BOSTON—Civic leaders and philanthropists formed "no meat" club. Twentieth Century Club votes to help; monster mass meeting called at Faneuil Hall.

KANSAS CITY—One leading restaurant discontinuing meat; 125 Methodists signed anti-meat pledge; 80,000 persons expected to sign anti-meat pledges.

MEMPHIS—Workmen's Civic League calls mass meeting to boycott meat; 200 signed anti-meat pledge.

BALTIMORE—Buttons with mottoes, "I don't buy meat, do you?" worn by men on streets.

NASHVILLE—Council of Labor calls mass meeting Sunday to boycott meat.

DENVER—Trades Assembly mass meeting Sunday to endorse boycott; leading hotels and restaurants willing to aid by serving vegetarian menus.

DES MOINES—Meat boycott pledges signed by many; labor unions take no action.

MILWAUKEE—Butchers alarmed at meat boycott, cut prices in two; hundreds join crusade.

FRESNO—Citizens prepare to join anti-meat crusade; butchers sell meat to country institutions at 7 cents a pound; charge private consumers double.

TACOMA—Citizens' mass meeting called to join meat boycott; Central Council to take action next Wednesday night.

SAFETY—Committee for citizens' mass meeting urges direct sale of produce to householders, possibly a co-operative store.

TUMULT RAISED AT CONVENTION

Miners Excited Over Motion to Read Vote as Polled By Unions

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 22.—The tellers of the balloting in the election of the international officers of the United Mine Workers of America were ordered by President Thomas Lewis, in the organization's convention today to read the vote by local unions because of the protests of his opponents that many unions had cast more votes than their membership authorized.

John H. Walker, president-elect of the Illinois district, declared that the convention had no authority to act on the report of the tellers and that the administration, despite all precedent, had interpreted the constitution to confer supreme authority upon the tellers. Green supported Walker's stand.

TUMULT IS RAISED.

President Lewis replied that the constitution plainly authorized his ruling and charged Green with maliciously impeding proceedings and ordered him to his seat. "Stand on your rights," Lewis called to the Sergeant-at-Arms to take "disturbances" out of the hall if they refused to obey the gavel.

The opening of today's session, on Green's demand, the tellers were called upon to read the detailed tabulation of the votes of the local unions of districts 1, 7 and 9 of the anthracite field of Pennsylvania and district 26 of Nova Scotia.

The reading was interrupted by a motion to print the report instead of continuing its reading, which provoked almost a riot. President Lewis ordered President Feehan of the Pittsburgh district from the hall. A hundred delegates rose to oppose the approach of the sergeant-at-arms, but Lewis at last restored order.

MOVE TO BREAK IT UP.

"There is every indication," he said, "that there is a movement to break up this convention."

The motion to print was carried when the president had agreed to read the validity of the vote of any local union to be questioned after the printed report had been distributed among the delegates. The vote was by districts for president.

A committee was appointed to go to Washington to urge upon Congress the passing of the bill providing for a government bureau of mines and mining, which will come up for vote in the House next Tuesday.

The convention at noon adjourned until Monday.

SCHWARTZ CASE IS CONTINUED

Alleged Bookmaker Arrested By Sheriff Barnett Is Held

Samuel K. Schwartz, who was arrested at the Oakland race track yesterday afternoon by Sheriff Frank Barnett on a charge of violating the anti-bookmaking law, appeared in Judge Samuel's department of the police court this morning and asked to have his arraignment postponed until Monday, when he could be represented by attorneys. The court granted the request.

Schwartz was arrested just after the last race yesterday by a representative of the district attorney's office who, according to the complaint, made two bets of \$10 each with Schwartz yesterday, passing him the money in each instance. Schwartz did not make a big book, but he had circulated around in the ring and accepted small wagers from the pickers.

The accused man is said to be the owner of a saloon at San Mateo. He was released on \$1000 bail for which a bond signed by L. K. Foster and W. Judgens, was substituted this morning.

Superintendent George Smith, of the Oakland race track, said that Schwartz had never purchased any advance information sheets in order to lay odds. A rumor to the effect that Schwartz was associated with Bookmaker Sam Stevens was denied by the latter.

Wait Developments In the Swope Mystery

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 22.—There were no developments in the Swope mystery over night. "We are simply marking time," said an attorney connected with the case. "Nothing is likely to occur until we hear definitely from Chicago experts. This may be any day, but likely nothing final will be known for a week or more."

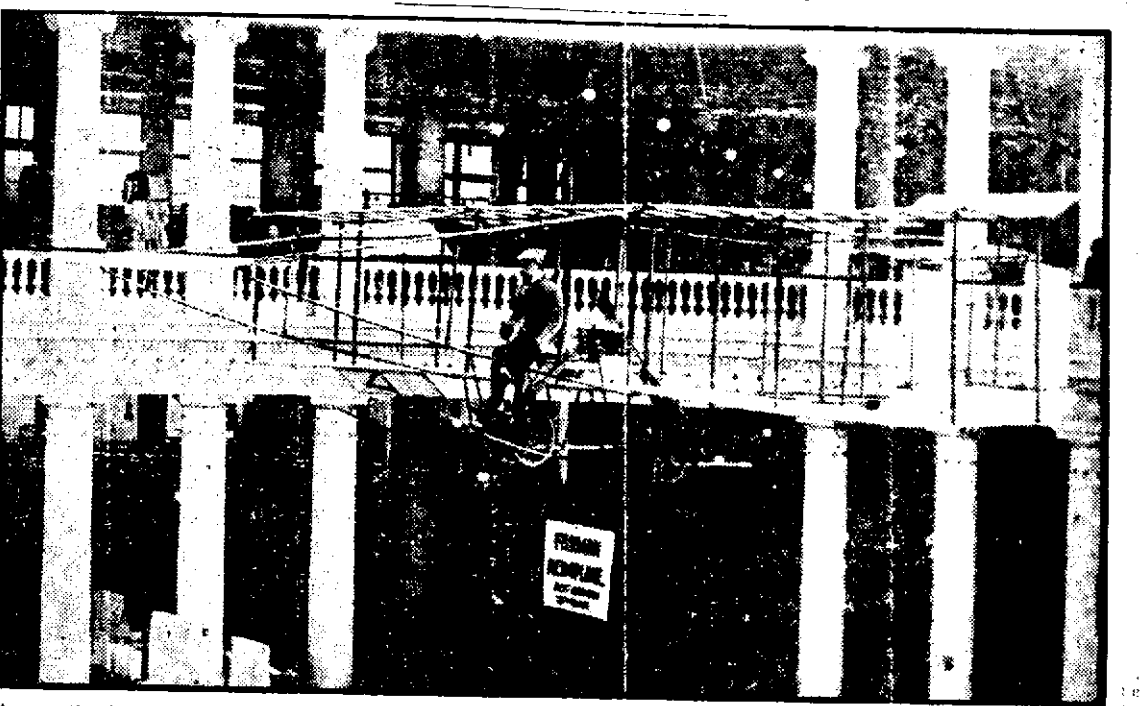

Public Can See Model Work Aeroplane Exhibit at Emporium Will Be of Interest to Thousands



Aeronautics have keyed the public interest to the highest pitch. The wonder of the age is aero navigation and the heavier than air type in aeroplanes have created as great enthusiasm as did the first automobiles.

The Aeronautic Society is planning a meet for San Francisco so that all might learn of this new invention of the twentieth century.

COLLINS STILL PUTS UP FIGHT

Bigamist Is Conducting His Own Case From State Penitentiary

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 22.—George D. Collins, formerly one of the best known criminal lawyers in San Francisco, perjured, and bigamist, whose sensational marriage to an Eastern girl whom he brought to this city in utter disregard of the fact that he had a wife still living here, continued to conduct his various cases in the courts from his prison cell in San Quentin penitentiary.

The convicted man, sent to state's prison for fourteen years for perjury, has served but six months of his term, and a motion to recall and vacate the process of his commitment is on the calendar in Judge Lawlor's court and came up for hearing today. Collins, always known as a clever lawyer, is now able in the management of his case, evidenced by his keeping out of the penitentiary for seven years, sent a letter to District Attorney Fleck, offering to withdraw his motion to vacate, provided the prosecution would move to dismiss the bigamy charge against him.

The latter was also on today's docket on a motion for restoring the records, and according to Assistant District Attorney Berry moved to dismiss the case. The court took the matter under advisement, and in the event that he declines to dismiss the accusation, Collins asked that the warden be ordered to release him temporarily from prison in order that he may come to San Francisco and argue on the motion to vacate the judgment which committed him to penal servitude.

The matter will be definitely decided next Saturday.

WILL IMPROVE CHINESE ROAD

Japanese Emperor Authorizes the Borrowing of a Large Sum

TOKIO, Jan. 22.—Almost simultaneously with Japan's negative reply to the United States proposal for the neutralization of the Manchurian railways, the emperor has issued a significant rescript authorizing the South Manchurian Railway company to borrow a sum of money equal to double its paid-in capital, but not exceeding the total capital.

This means that the South Manchurian Railway, whose total capital is \$100,000,000, of which \$22,000,000 has been paid in, can borrow \$78,000,000.

It is understood \$20,000,000 will be borrowed immediately and devoted to the development of the Antung-Mukden line, the improvement of Port Arthur as a great commercial port.

thing they might say would make them amenable to the provisions of the boycott law. Despite their unwillingness to talk, it is understood that favorable action will be taken on the letters received.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Jan. 22.—Meat is getting too high for members of the World's League, and last night a resolution agreeing to refrain from eating meat for more than once a day for one month, beginning February 1, was adopted.

This is the first concerted step in Louisville taken towards fighting the high price of meat.

HOTEL MEN ASSIST.

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 22.—A new phase of the meat boycott enters into the situation in this city through the hotel men, who are the meat abstainers. In one of the big downtown hotels last night, the manager caused signs to be displayed announcing that, beginning today, dinners devoid of meat would be served to those who so desired.

"We have not noticed any appreciable slackening in the demand for meat among our patrons," said this boniface, "but I think this is largely because a person does not include in ordering a meal that restaurant in Pittsburgh a big noon hour and evening business is done in regular orders—meats for which there is a fixed price—and all these include meat or game or fish in some form. Beginning today, we intend to serve one special all-vegetable meal in addition to the regular meat orders. It is an experiment, and if the trade shows interest the plan will be enlarged upon."

Other hotel and restaurant men, when they learned of the plan, enthusiastically endorsed it, and it is promised that the next few days will see an all-vegetable meal service inaugurated in many eating houses in this city.

VEGETABLE SALES INCREASE.

READING, Pa., Jan. 22.—Farmers and dealers today reported an increased sale of vegetables in consequence of the meat boycott inaugurated by workmen. The determination to eat less meat is spreading throughout this section of Pennsylvania.

NEW YORK BOYCOTT.

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—The fight for cheaper meat waxed hotter in New York today. The city's food took a new turn for thirty days or more were extensively circulated and signed and indications were that the local movement will reach impressive proportions.

Formal action by many organized bodies is expected to follow the general trend among families to cut down their meat consumption—a movement already said to have reduced sales at the retail shops 50 per cent.

Women are taking the lead in the local agitation. Today's newspapers were being made for a great mass meeting of women in Union Square at noon next Tuesday to protest against the high price of meat and to consider "meat abstention pledges."

The National Progressive Women's Suffrage Union is arranging for the demonstration.

LEGISLATIVE ACTION.

CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—The revolt against the high prices of food took another turn here today when W. T. Amador, State Senator, announced that he would move for a legislative inquiry into the subject.

"At the reopening of the session Tuesday," said Mr. Amador, "I will introduce a resolution providing that a committee be appointed to investigate the cause of the high prices for foodstuffs."

SPOKANE, Jan. 22.—It is proposed to bring the anti-meat movement before Monday evening for official action. It is predicted that practically all the sectional leagues will take individual action. They appear to declare the importance of the butchers. The Restaurant Association is also considering the price problem, one of the proposals being that all the sales shall strip meat from kinds of meat from their bills of fare and at the same time as an object lesson to the dealers.

HALE FARES FOR CHILDREN ASKED

Superintendent McClymonds Working for Rate for Pupils

J. W. McClymonds, superintendent of the Oakland public schools, is working zealously for the establishment of the half-fare system on the lines of the Oakland Traction Company for the school children of Greater Oakland. The movement was originated by the improvement clubs of various sections, who, with the power and influence of the local board of education hope to secure the lower rate for the little ones.

A. L. Hanna was appointed by the board as chairman of the committee which will look for a reduction in fares last year without success. The matter was acted upon at the regular meeting of the board, which will be held next Tuesday evening.

WOMAN ALMOST GETS DARING BURGLAR MAN

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 22.—A burglar, who attempted to break into the home of Charles E. McPherson, 234 Bartlett street, raising a side window at 1:45 this morning, was almost captured by Mrs. A. Roteau, who occupied the lower flat and who screamed at him and ran to the front door to cut off his escape.

The man got away by vaulting a rear fence and running down a back street.

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
