PROUD HE ENLISTED

Private Robert Walsh has written an interesting letter to his father John Walsh concerning army life which is interesting, especially in face of the fact that certain statements have been made of late by writers reflecting on the treatment of soldiers in the regular army.

Vancouver Barracks, Wash., January 9, 1911.
Dear Father: Having received your letter of the 2nd inst. I will answer it to the best of my ability. I am getting along about as usual. I suppose a number of people take the Cosmopolitan magazine and they have read the article referring to the regular army by Bailey Millard. Well for myself I want to say that I have not been mistreated in any way and when someone tells you that he has, you can bank on it that he is one of the type that are always breaking the rules. In these instances they are given a trial and it usually develops on the testimony given that the man is worthless to the army and to the public at large.

The regulars of the United States Army are not what people so often think them. A man does not have any occasion to feel that he is a prisoner for he has ample freedom when off duty. He is allowed to dress in civilian clothes and go out and enjoy himself as if he never saw the army. As long as he is back for the calls, drill, parade, retreat or other formations that are ordered, there is nothing said. In fact an enlisted man has more than many laboring men can afford. Now our post for instance. We have reveille at 6 A. M. followed by exercises and at 6:30 Mess or (breakfast). After breakfast the soldier helps clean up the squad room, makes his own bunk, then with others police up the grounds around the quarters. From 8 until 8:30 drill in the gymnasium. At 9:45 A. M. drill call and participates in drills until 10:50 and at 11 takes part in the parade providing weather is favorable. At 12 o'clock mess is called and then off until 4:50 which is retreat (the lowering of the flag). Test-tube sounds at 9 o'clock though he can retire earlier if he chooses and at 10:45 there is the call to quarters and every member who is not on what is called check pass is required to be in his bunk and if he is absent he is reported by a non-commissioned officer in charge of quarters to the officer of the day, and the next day he is asked to give an account to the commander of the company. If he cannot explain satisfactorily he is punished by being given extra work. (Private Walsh also goes more into detail in reference to private life).

Continuing Mr. Walsh says: My regiment will sail for the Philippines in September, about the fifth. All who go will receive 20 per cent more pay and double time on retirement. Speaking of Bally Millard's article in the Cosmopolitan Magazine I can add that it is all hear say as I understand that he has never served in the army. Now how can a man write of conditions which he does not understand anything about? Of course I know that he is withdrawing some statements. Why? Because he has been forced to, being on the wrong track. Those who have not seen army life would find it very interesting. For my part in any dispute between you and I I am proud of it.

BROWN BEATS WOLGAST

Champion Bested All the Way in Philadelphia Fight.

Michigan Boy Outfought and Made Poor Showing—Rough, Gruelling Fight from Start to Finish.

Philadelphia, Feb. 9. — To the surprise of 5,000 fight fans, Knockout Brown, New York's lightweight pugilist, beat Champion Al Wolgast all the way in a fierce six round fight at the American A. C. here. Brown carried the battle to Wolgast in every round. He was wonderfully strong and aggressive and Wolgast took many hard knocks. It was Wolgast's stamina and ring generalship that prevented Brown from knocking him out, but at that on several occasions the champion was hard pressed.

On work and blows landed Brown had the fight by a conspicuous margin. Wolgast wasn't outclassed, but he was clearly outfought and made a poor showing under the circumstances. It was his first battle in a year and he did not show his best form. But even at his best, he could not have won from his antagonist. As the fight progressed and Brown showed superior fighting ability, Wolgast resorted to all kinds of rough tactics. He held in the clinches, wrestled and tried to push Brown through the ropes. For this he was roundly scored by a big, fair minded crowd. Brown, though the heavier hitter, could not score a knockdown. Wolgast took terrific punishment in the stomach and on the jaw without wabbling, a fact that demonstrated his great stamina.

In the fourth round Wolgast's jabs made Brown's nose bleed. In the fifth K. O. returned the compliment so earnestly that the champion's mouth was full of the crimson stuff. It was a rough, gruelling fight from start to finish and Brown, unknown two years ago, covered himself with glory. But in a fight to a finish it would be hard to predict a winner. Wolgast lacked speed and that was the secret of his clean cut defeat. Brown stated after the fight that he would meet Wolgast for the title anywhere and at any time. The New York fighter received an ovation from a big crowd of admirers from Gotham who backed him loyally and went home happy. The betting odds were 8 to 5 with Wolgast the favorite.

GIRL SHOT; MONEY GONE

"Queen of Little Hungary" in Aurora Fatally Wounded.

Girl Had Drawn Several Hundred Dollars and Was Intending to Elope When Shot—Flame in Jail.

Aurora, Ill., Feb. 9.—Florence Salvom, a pretty dark-haired Roumanian girl, 16 years old, styled "the Queen of Little Hungary," was shot fatally by George Karaser, 27 years old, with whom she was about to elope.

The girl had drawn all her savings, amounting to several hundred dollars, from the bank. This money was missing when she was found unconscious on the Northwestern railroad tracks, suffering from four bullet wounds.

Karaser was arrested several hours afterward and when confronted with a statement made by the dying girl confessed that he had shot her. It was not a premeditated attack, he declared. He pointed the revolver at her in fun, he said, and, growing excited, pulled the trigger. Once he had fired, an insane impulse came over him, he continued, and he emptied the revolver, firing at his victim as she lay on the ground. The girl was taken to the St. Charles hospital, where surgeons say she cannot recover.

DEFENDS LORIMER IN SENATE SPEECH

Johnston of Alabama Holds His Election Was Legally Won

CULLOM ALSO MAKES SPEECH

Replies to Challenge of Senator Hale and Denies That Bribery Was Ever Used in His Campaign in Illinois.

Washington, Feb. 9.—Senator William Lorimer had an inning in the senate. Mr. Johnston of Alabama took the floor in his behalf and in a spirited speech defended and sustained the report of the committee which declared the Illinois senator's election valid.

Senator Cullom also addressed the senate. He did not make an argument in the Lorimer case, but he replied to the challenge of Senator Hale and the talk on corruption in the Illinois legislature, defending his title and placing upon the record facts which he said showed that no bribery or corruption of any kind was ever used in his behalf.

Senator Lorimer has gone to Chicago, it is said, to consult a physician concerning his ear. While he was en route to Chicago his friends were arriving in Washington to urge Senator Cullom to vote for him.

Len Small, United States assistant treasurer at Chicago, accompanied by S. B. Roach, a Kankakee editor, called on Mr. Cullom, but did not succeed in obtaining any promise favorable to Mr. Lorimer. They asserted that the people of Illinois by a large majority were with Mr. Lorimer in his fight to retain his seat, and that Mr. Cullom would be responding to the popular will by aiding his colleague.

Representative Apudoc of the Illinois state legislature reinforced the Lorimer following in the capital.

Many letters from people in Illinois are being received relative to the Lorimer case. Most of the letters, it is said, are from supporters of Lorimer. Whether they will succeed in convincing Senator Cullom that the people of the state are behind Mr. Lorimer may depend in a measure on what those who are opposed to Mr. Lorimer do before the vote is taken.

If Reciprocity Treaty Fails President Will Summon Solons.

Washington, Feb. 9.—An extra session of congress will be called immediately after March 4 unless the Canadian reciprocity treaty is brought to a vote before that time.

President Taft served notice to this effect on the lawmakers through Senators Crane of Massachusetts and Carter of Montana.

President Taft left Washington today for a trip to Illinois, and will deliver one or two important reciprocity speeches on that journey.
