Mrs. Rosenberg, Refugee Cousin Meet First Time

CAMP KILLMER, N. J. (UP) — Mrs. Anna Rosenberg, former assistant secretary of defense, met her second cousin, a Hungarian refugee, for the first time at a reception center here Tuesday.

She learned of the arrival of her cousin, Bela Parkas, and his wife from a dispatch from Washington and contacted the couple through the Army Locator Service.

Mrs. Rosenberg, who served in the Truman administration and now operates a labor-public relations firm, was accompanied on her visit here by another cousin, Mrs. Madeline Feilks.

Railroads Stand Firm Against Wage Demands

CHICAGO (UP) — The nation's railroads told a presidential fact-finding board that they cannot afford a wage increase demanded by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen.

Howard Nitzert, railroad counsel, told the board at its opening session Tuesday that the union's demands would set off an inflationary spiral in the industry.

William P. Kennedy, president of the brotherhood, replied that the trainmen have fallen behind other unions in wages and working conditions, and that its demands are designed to correct inequities.

The brotherhood seeks a \$3 daily wage increase and seven paid holidays for all employees, a \$2.50 daily raise for trainmen in short turn-around service, and reduced hours for dining car stewards.

Cairo Will Have First State Police Sub-Post

CAIRO, Ill. (UP) — The first Illinois state police sub-post in the state will be established here and another is being considered at Rockford.

State Police Supt. W.H. Morris said the sub-post here will be under the jurisdiction of District 13, whose headquarters are at Du Quoin, and will be manned on a 24-hour basis.

A building constructed by the Highway Department as a toll station in Cairo has been secured to serve as headquarters for the sub-post, Morris said. It will be placed in operation as soon as radio equipment can be obtained and installed.

The 17-county Du Quoin district has the largest area of any state police district in Illinois.

Morris said another sub-post is being considered for Rockford.

COVENTRY, England — Jaguar Motors Wednesday announced what it called the world's fastest production-line car, specifically intended for the American market. The two-seater XKSS will reach a speed of 170 miles per hour and is suited for both road use and sports car racing, the company said.

10 Per Cent of Mexicans Stay

"the first significant general rise" — 2.7 per cent — in consumer prices since 1952. Industrial price increases "on a broad front" averaged 8 per cent. Wholesale prices jumped 4 per cent.

And a round of wage boosts exceeded labor's increase in productivity, he said.

Because of these inflationary factors and the other "uncertainties," he called on Congress to hold taxes at present levels and to keep federal spending within limits of his \$71.8 billion budget.

He appealed to business to protect the public from unwarranted price boosts and to avoid excesses in plant expansion and use of credit.

He urged labor leaders to keep wage negotiations in line with actual increases in productivity.

"Business and labor leadership have the responsibility of reaching agreements on wages and other labor benefits that are fair to the rest of the community as well as to those persons immediately involved," Mr. Eisenhower said.

"Negotiated wage increases and benefits should be consistent with productivity prospects and with the maintenance of a stable dollar. And businesses must recognize the broad public interest in the prices set on their products and services."

Continued prosperity "with price stability" depends on the cooperation of business, labor and government at all levels, he said.

The major contribution of the federal government in the fight against inflation, he said, was a budget surplus for three straight years. The government "tight money" policy also had helped keep price increases from being larger than they were, he said.
