Robt. D. Lynd, Camp Director, born on a Michigan farm, business trained in Detroit, Graduate of Albion College, in Young Men's Christian Association service in City, rural Canadian National Council, and suburban areas since 1914, has always been deeply interested in out-of-doors life and particularly in the educational values possible in the modern summer camp.

Senior Counselors are selected from the ranks of College graduate students, upper Classmen in college and university, and from the teaching corps of many of the schools in the County.

The maturity, character and ability of its counselors is not surpassed by any other camp in Michigan.

A variety of abilities is sought,—Music, song leading, dramatization, pageantry, story telling, nature lore, sailing, swimming, diving, boating, manual arts, archery, leathercraft, woodwork, woodcraft, photography, journalism, horsemanship, sports, fishing, worship, hiking, canoeing, Indian lore, out-of-doors cooking, etc.

All water activities are carefully supervised by competent and experienced counselors. The counselor group includes 10 or more swimmers with life saving certificates. The supervisor of the water-front annually passes a rigid Y. M. C. A. and Red Cross Life Saving examination.

What To Take

These are essential: 3 dark heavy blankets or equivalents, 2 sheets, pillow slips and pillows, bathing suit, 2 bath towels, flannel pajamas, change of underwear and long stockings, sweater, shorts, old trousers, tennis shoes, rain coat, laundry bag, (heavy shoes are desirable for hiking), comb and brush, rubber blanket or poncho, toothbrush and paste, soap in box, handkerchiefs, Bible and note book. The following are desirable: riding boots, sleeping bag, pocket knife, flashlight, cheap watch, fishing tackle, needle and thread, safety pins, kodak and films, musical instrument, binoculars, comic costume, compass. **BE SURE EVERY ARTICLE IS MARKED WITH NAME.** Pack in a SMALL steamer trunk, box or suitcase and blanket roll.

ACTIVITIES

Canoe trips on the Au Sable—Three and one half days of thrilling adventure in canoes—learning to live close to nature.

Archery Rovers Range—A game like golf except that bows and arrows are used.

Swimming and Boating—Boys are instructed in swimming, life-saving, diving, boating, canoeing, sailing. Water polo and other sports are enjoyed.

Horsemanship—Eight or ten horses and instructor from the Devonshire Downs Stables, Bloomfield Hills will make riding most interesting this year.

Arts and Crafts—In the ranch barn, campers enjoy making things—Archery equipment, basketry, models, sculpture, etc. Here, the boy can do what he most desires.

Sports of all kinds, campfire programs, fishing, music, reading, hiking, photography, dramatics, and many other activities are offered.

Tennis—It is expected that the tennis courts will be finished before camp opens.

Nature Lore—Hiking trips, lake exploring, animal study, auto trips, and nature trails will be made.

Library—200 books from Detroit and State Libraries.

MAQUA—Ideal Camp for Girls on beautiful Loon Lake opposite Mahn-Go-Tah-See Camp. Canoe Trip—Nearly four days on the Au Sable—\$5.00 extra.

Craft Supplies—Boys pay for material, which will average one dollar a week.

Laundry—Laundry is sent out once a week.

Located on Loon Lake in Iosco County, 150 miles north, in the heart of the Au Sable country, adjacent to the 500,000 acre National Forest Reserve, with such interesting points nearby as the "Rollways," Five Channels Dam, Silver Creek Trout-rearing Station, forest ranger's stations and many other lakes. This camp consists of 427 acres of woods, hills, and lake front, with a mile and a half of beach. It has a fine club house with dining room and fireplace, complete kitchen and store rooms, office, camp store, bank, post-office, and library; screened tent houses with board floors, comfortable double-decked bunks, dock, swimming pier, and boats, canoes, a sail boat and health unit well equipped are included in the equipment. The history of "Y" camps in Oakland County has been almost unbroken since 1901. The camps were first operated by the Pontiac Association and later by the Town and Country Association. For the past eight years the camp has been conducted co-operatively by the four Associations in Oakland County—Birmingham, Pontiac, Royal Oak Township, and Town and Country.

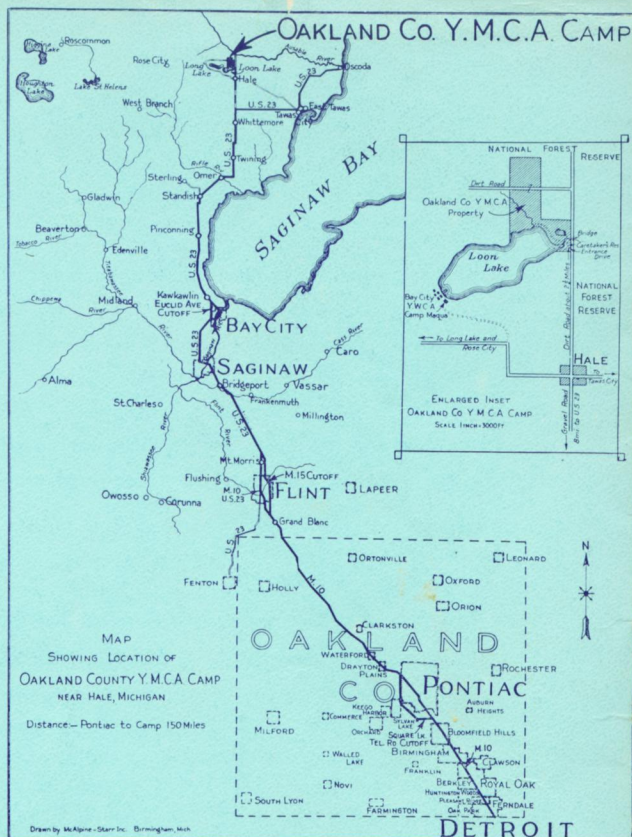
